

Vote with Your Wallet

One way to help encourage freedom and motorcycle safety and awareness is to look for businesses that support ABATE and the motorcycle community. Remember, a business does not have to be "motorcycle related" to support ABATE by being a business member. Ask your local coffee shop, grocery store, even the independently owned fast food restaurant.

Fund the Solutions

People around the state are implementing solutions for motorcycle safety and awareness, and they need funding.

local city officials around the state. See what you can do in your neighborhood. If you need help, I am always available.

Pressure Your Politicians

Sometimes we forget that we are the ones who vote our politicians into office, and many of our elected officials are not doing their duty in working to advance freedom and help keep our roadways safe for ALL.

It's time to let them know that motorcycle safety is a key voting issue. Unless elected officials hear from you, their constituents, they will continue to cave to pressure from special interests that want to prevent legislative progress on freedom for motorcyclists.

Spread the Word

The larger the network of informed motorcycle advocates, the more of an impact we can have -- both locally and nationally. That's where you come in. Share the message of ABATE. Grassroots organization around the state. A BBQ at your house with your neighbors to let them know about what issues we are working on and how they can help. Go grab a cup of coffee with others. 

Monday June 18 is Ride to Work Day

WASHINGTON, DC – This coming Monday will mark the 27th anniversary of "Ride to Work Day," an annual event that promotes the motorcycle as an option for commuting to work. Since 1992, this event has been promoted by the Ride to Work organization with a goal of increasing public awareness of

motorcyclists; promoting the use of motorcycles as a method of transportation; and increasing motorcycle safety.

According to the Motorcycle Industry Council, an estimated 150,000 commuters ride their motorcycle to work. While this is a very minor portion of all commuters, figures show these numbers are on the rise. It may be surprising that the numbers are not higher given data that supports that traveling by motorcycle can shorten journey times by as much as 33 minutes of every hour for city travel. Additional benefits can include more parking options, fuel savings and the undeniable advantage of enjoying the environment and the open air preparing yourself for a long day of work, or better yet, decompressing postwork!

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation encourages its members and partners to participate in this year's event on June 18th to help demonstrate support for riders across the nation and spur recognition that the use of motorcycles as an alternative to commuting can help alleviate traffic and parking congestion. 

Email mrfoffice@mrf.org to make sure your email is included on your membership.

Remember that the reason more motorcyclists are not members of ABATE is because they have never been asked to join! So when you are out with other riders at an event or maybe you just ran into another rider at the gas stop, ASK! Always carry a membership tri-fold with you. The time to organize and fight for our rights and freedoms is BEFORE they are all gone!

There are a few State House races that are worth watching. Since everyone one of our state legislative seats are open this election cycle, the entire Arizona legislature can change it's look in November. Last election cycle only 2 incumbents lost reelection.

I want to highlight a few House races to watch this month. Next month I will highlight a few Senate races.

Legislative District 9

The only Republican in the race is Ana Henderson. She ran last election cycle but

lost to Democrats Randal Friese and Pamela Powers-Hannley. Ana Henderson lost by less than 4000 votes. Watch this district.

Legislative District 12

LD12 has 7 candidates running for 2 seats. Talk about competition. Incumbent Travis Grantham and Senator Warren Petersen seem to have name recognition but with 2 other Republicans and 3 Democrats in the mix, anything can happen.

Legislative District 20

Incumbent Anthony Kern and Shawna Bolick, wife of Arizona Supreme Court Justice Clint Bolick are the only Republicans in the field against 4 Democrats.

I am watching those three districts going into the primary in August. All across our state, so many candidates but who to choose? We are working on a Voters Guide for you.

Tips for the Elections:

1. Do your research. You can do this by attending the LD meetings for both parties. I've been doing this and have already made my decision for the candidates I will be voting for because I asked them questions to their face.

2. Vote like an Arizona

Motorcyclist. Ask the candidates about the motorcycling issues YOU care about.

3. Make your vote count. You DO NOT have to vote for 2 Representatives. You can but are not required to. This is called a "single shot" vote. It's a numeric way to get YOUR candidate elected. By only voting for a single representative, you are essentially giving your candidate 1.5 votes by denying another candidate a vote. It's a strategic way to get your candidate into office.

I hope this helps. Remember: Freedom is a team sport!

NEW 'A BIKER'S GUIDE TO MAK-ING LAW' BROCHURE AVAILABLE FROM NCOM

The latest in a line of "BIKER'S GUIDE" brochures was recently unveiled during the Mock Legislative Session at this year's NCOM Convention in Mobile, Alabama. Conducted by the National Coalition Of Motorcyclists' Legislative Task Force (NCOM-LTF), the seminar was a hands-on demonstration of passing legislation, providing a perfect opportunity to unveil the new "A BIKER'S GUIDE TO MAKING LAW" educational brochure of similar topic.

The new tri-fold brochure was produced by the NCOM-LTF to explain how to get a bill introduced and lobby for pro-motorcycle legislation, and is being provided free of charge to any Motorcycle Rights Organization (MRO), Confederation of Clubs (COC), NCOM Member Group, club or organization, through Aid to Injured Motorcyclists (A.I.M.) and the Law Offices of Richard M. Lester.

"The Biker's Guide was well received," said Frank Ernst, Chairman of the NCOM-LTF following the mock session on May 12th. "After we passed them out, many attendees came up and asked if

they could have additional copies, and most agreed it is a valuable tool and will give people help on how to get started in the process."

MOTORCYCLIST FATALITIES TREND **DOWNWARD**

Nationwide motorcycle traffic fatalities dropped by 5.6% from 2016 to 2017, a new report shows. The Governors Highway Safety Association released a report in May showcasing preliminary data on last year's motorcycle fatalities by state. Per the report, U.S. motorcycle fatalities dropped by 296 deaths -- from 5,286 in 2016 to a projected 4,990 last year. That's coming off a 5.1% increase in such road fatalities from 2015 to 2016, the report states.

The figures reported are projections based on preliminary data provided for 2017 from all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Compared with 2016, motorcyclist fatalities are estimated to have decreased in 30 states, remained the same in two states, and increased in 18 states.

E15 ETHANOL PROTECTION PRO-POSED IN CONGRESS

U.S. Representatives Austin Scott (R-GA) and Lois Frankel (D-FL) have introduced the bipartisan "Consumer Protection and Fuel Transparency Act of 2018" to require the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to expand consumer awareness on how to safely use fuel containing more than 10% ethanol.

Since motorcycle and ATV engines are prohibited from using fuel with more than 10% ethanol content, namely E15 (fuel containing 15% ethanol), improved labeling, fuel pump safeguards, and education outreach are key to protecting consumers. E15 fuel is sold at many retail gas stations, and currently 63% of consumers assume all products sold at these stations are safe for their engines despite the fact that high ethanol fuel blends can damage smaller engines and void manufacturer warranties.

RETALIATORY TARIFFS WOULD 'SIGNIFICANTLY IMPACT' HARLEY-**DAVIDSON**

With the full support of all 28 member states, the European Union will impose "rebalancing" tariffs on U.S. imports ranging from Harley-Davidson motorcycles to Levi's jeans beginning in July in retaliation over President Donald Trump's decision to put duties on European aluminum and steel. After failing to win

trade concessions, on June 1 the Trump administration withdrew exemptions given to imported metals from the EU, Canada and Mexico from global tariffs imposed in March, citing "national security" interests.

Harley-Davidson has warned of a "significant impact" on its sales from reprisal duties, saying in a statement; "We believe a punitive, retaliatory tariff on Harley-Davidson motorcycles in any of our major markets would have a significant impact on our sales, our dealers, our suppliers and our customers in those markets."

The Milwaukee-based Motor Company claims such tariffs on raw materials would inflate its costs by an additional \$15-20 million this year.

Likewise, India is countering the Trump tariffs by proposing an increase on import duty on 30 American products, including specific motorcycles imported from the U.S.", by up to 100%.

The Motorcycle Industry Council, in coordination with the Congressional Motorcycle Caucus, hosted a briefing on "Intelligent Transportation Systems and Automated Vehicle Applications Impacts on Motorcycle Safety" on May 22. Caucus co-chairs, U.S. Representatives Tim Walberg (R-MI) and Michael Burgess (R-TX) addressed the Caucus's mission to support riders through education and awareness, the potential for technologies to improve the riding experience and bring in new riders, and why the discussion on how motorcycles will factor into a connected and autonomous world is so important.

The briefing, moderated by Callie Hoyt, MIC's manager of federal affairs, featured a panel of industry and research experts: Sam Campbell, BMW Group; Gary Higgins, American Honda Motor Company, Inc.; Shane McLaughlin, Virginia Tech Transportation Institute; and Eric Teoh, Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

"Visibility on the road can equate to life or death for motorcyclists, and human error is a major factor in that equation. If emerging connected and automated technologies are developed to correctly detect and respond to motorcycles, their deployment holds the potential to considerably decrease motorcyclist injury and fatality rates," Hoyt said.

Panelists discussed how connected and autonomous applications relate to motorcycles, how the applications can supplement one another, and the overall effect that widespread connected and automated technology can have on motorcycling.

Both the House and Senate have been developing legislation that would establish the first federal regulatory framework for autonomous vehicle (AV) technologies. The briefing recognized the importance of ensuring that the needs of everyone on the road -- particularly motorcyclists -- are addressed in AV legislative and regulatory landscapes, as well as in real-life applications.

Advanced technology will also affect motorcycle rider training programs, and the panel talked about the need to train riders on how to interact with connected and automated vehicles.

AUTOMATED VEHICLE TECHNOLOGY SHOWING UP ON MOTORCY-CLES TOO

It's not only cars and trucks: automated tech is starting to show up wherever there are wheels, and companies are starting to focus on making motorcycles safer with automated-driving technology. Exposed to the elements and operating on two wheels instead of four, motorcyclists are particularly defenseless in the event of a crash. Yet there's been little innovation in the motorcycle safety industry until recently.

Earlier this year, major auto parts supplier Bosch announced it was working on driver-assistance systems for motorcycles, like adaptive cruise control, which accelerates and decelerates to avoid potential collisions. Before that, a Canadian startup called Damon X Labs also launched with the intention of creating a similar system for motorcycles.

Now, Israel-based startup Ride Vision is also working on rider safety features for motorcycles, creating an alert system that uses relatively inexpensive front- and rearview cameras to give a 360-degree view of the motorcycle's immediate surroundings. The system uses lights attached to the motorcycle's rearview mirrors to alert the motorcyclist when there is a chance of collision -- whether there's a car passing or. if the rider is leaning too hard

Skully Technologies, an Atlanta-based wearable tech company, is introducing a DOT certified motorcycle helmet that has augmented reality and artificial intelligence features including a heads-up display, rearview camera, Smart Phone and Bluetooth integration, with hands-free control and other smart technology.

While some of the self-driving sensors and systems are the same between cars and motorcycles, it's a notably different product says recode.net; "While the mechanics are different, the automated motorcycle industry will likely move in a similar direction as the autonomous car industry. Startups and suppliers alike will rush to partner with major motorcycle manufacturers to begin testing and then eventually producing vehicles with this technology."

NEW HAMPSHIRE BANS MOTORCY-CLE-ONLY ROADSIDE CHECK-POINTS

Motorcycle-only roadside checkpoints first appeared in New York in 2009; functioning like sobriety checkpoints, motorcycle-only checkpoints (MOC) allow law enforcement to pull over motorcyclists without cause, for an onthe-spot safety, license, and helmet inspection. Since then, these so-called safety checkpoints have popped up across the country and have spiked controversy as opponents claim invasion of privacy and discrimination against motorcyclists over the operators of other motor vehicles.

Nineteen states now bar such roadblocks either through legislation or judicial proceedings (AK CA IL ID IA LA MD MO MI MN NC NH OR RI TX VA WA WI & WY), and in 2015 Congress banned the use of federal funds for MOCs as part of the FAST Act highway bill. Yet they continue to be a problem for bikers in some states.

Although in 2011 New Hampshire became the first state to prohibit the use of federal funds to conduct discriminatory motorcycle-only stops by police, the "Live Free Or Die" state recently enacted Senate Bill 516 to prohibit motorcycle-only checkpoints outright.

Signed by Governor Chris Sununu on May 30, 2018, effective immediately; "No law enforcement officer or agency shall establish or conduct motorcycle-only checkpoints."

PHILIPPINE RESOLUTION CALLS FOR REVIEW OF ALL ANTI-BIKER LAWS

Senator Grace Poe of the Philippines has recently filed a resolution in the Senate to look into legislation and ordinances that lead to the discrimination of motorcycle riders. The resolution notes the prevalence of, "stricter checkpoints specifically targeting motorcycle riders and the latter are now perceived by the community as reckless riders and/or prone to criminal activities."

It cites the following activities as discriminatory to riders: "a. irregular PNP checkpoints; b. national laws that penalize motorcycle riders excessively; c. high fines being imposed against motorcycle riders; and d. local ordinances that have overlooked the income of minimum wage-earning motorists."

The resolution is hoped to review current legislation, ordinances, and law enforce-

ment practices that specifically target motorcycle riders. Riders of the Philippines recently united several groups to ride in protest of such discriminatory practices, and drew several thousand attendees.

The resolution, filed on May 28, 2018, ends with the statement, "that while it intends to substantially bring down the number of accidents and crimes involving motorcycles, the State shall not do so to the detriment of the rights of motorcycle riders who seem to be treated with automatic disdain and "Harassment" at times."

MOTORCYCLE RACING ENDANGERED BY INSURANCE IN ENGLAND & THE EU

Motorcycle racing is in danger in the U.K. and across Europe as new insurance rules loom, and the Motorcycle Industry Association (MIA) has called on EU member governments to reject the latest European Commission proposals, which have the potential to end all competitive motorsports across England..."Even if this means defying Brussels."

The EU directive amends aspects of the Motor Insurance Directive, responding to the so-called 'Vnuk' judgment from 2014 which ruled that all mechanically propelled vehicles must have third-party insurance, even if they are only used on private land.

The insurance industry has already made it clear that it would be difficult to provide such insurance given the risks involved with racing and that doing so could be incredibly expensive and lead to "catastrophic damage inflicted on motorsports across the board if this ruling becomes law," according to the MIA. In other EU countries where this has already been applied, premiums have risen dramatically making many events unsustainable.

The proposals represent a complete U-turn from the European Commission's previous position in 2016, when it proposed to exclude vehicles not being used 'in traffic'. This would have made all forms of motorsports exempt from the impact of the ruling, impacting around £11 billion (\$14.6 billion USD) to the U.K. economy alone.
























REGISTER TO VOTE

Mike Infanzon ABATE of AZ Designated Lobbyist

The ability to change the political landscape in an area may seem like a daunting task for many. I take it as a challenge.

As a reminder, ABATE is a non-partisan political organization whose main purpose is to:

- (a) Promote safety and educational programs and other programs to improve the general image of the motorcycle community.
- (b) Preserve and protect the rights of motorcyclists by informing the membership on all relevant regulations and legislation and promote political action campaigns in the best interest of the motorcycle community.
- (c) Oppose discrimination that is based upon race, color, creed, religion, national origin, gender, sexual preference, brand of motorcycle ridden, association, membership or non-membership in any club or organization.

Two-thirds of our mission is to fight. One of the ways that a motorcyclist can fight is to vote. It makes an elected official sit up and listen when I can walk into their office and say, "not only do I represent ABATE as a whole,

but 49 of our members live in YOUR district".

We launched AzMVP (Arizona Motorcycle Voters Project) last year as a way to encourage motorcyclists to vote. We have been helping many to not only register to vote but also get their civil rights restored in order to vote. AzMVP is a 501c3 owned by ABATE of Arizona.

To Register to Vote In Arizona You

How to Walk your Motorcycle -The ABATE Way

Moving and walking your motorcycle without power is part of motorcycle riding and management. Just ask our East Valley ABATE experts Jack Batty and Redbone, they say no matter what height, size or weight of the motorcycle, with practice and the right technique you'll be able to move and walk your motorcycle with confidence and full control on any surface and in the tightest of spaces. Joe Ferruci and his wife Deb opt to sit on their bikes and paddle it with their feet to move it. Though this might be okay in some situations it's far from efficient. Riders also tend to opt for this method for fear of dropping their bike and who wants that to happen? Not Joe Silk! Even in his garage he says when moving it around or at a fuel station, or getting out of a parking space maneuvering it by walking beside it is not only faster, but far easier than you think!

Here follows the tips and techniques to master moving and walking your motorcycle. Tim Zemnick from Coolidge reminds us to be sure to start slow and take the time to practice. The East Valley Chapter can show the Shadow Mountain members this method in their sleep according to Coordinator Mike Schneider.

- 1. Whats on your head? Depending on your helmet type and the amount of space you're moving around in, you may want to remove your helmet to ensure full vision. Keep your gloves on to ensure sturdy grip.
- 2. Gimme a brake lever! Stand on the left side of the bike as though you are going to get on. Hold the handgrip while covering the front brake with two fingers. You'll need access to the brake to control any potential rolling of the bike.
- 3. What gear lets ya roll her? If your motorcycle is in gear, put it in neutral for

ease of movement. Don't hold the clutch in, this will interfere with maximum grip for control.

- 4. Stand me up will ya? Lift the bike off the side stand slighting tilting the bike towards you and your body. Kick the side stand up/ deploying it. Get it out of your way. Often riders think this should stay down for when you lose balance but the side stand is a hazard in itself. If it contacts ground while you're moving the bike it can jar it and cause you to lose balance and drop the bike. It also interferes with your footing walking path.
- 5. Mover yer butt! For balancing and managing the weight of the bike, don't try to hold all of its weight in your hands. Lean or rest it on your hip or right side of the body so that you have a light weighted grip on the handlebars. Push your hip into the seat or tank depending on your height. This will help steer the bike. Again and depending on your bike, you should be able to fully support the weight of the bike on your upper leg and hip.

Let me see if you can do the walk now.

- 6. Push me! Here you can use your body as the forward push force powering your motorcycle. Many focus on power to the handlebars forgetting the body can be a big help here too. Use your hip, driving it into the tank or seat gives you surprisingly more momentum. Of course if you have a low chopper style motorcycle you'll have no choice but to power forward by pushing solely on the handle-
- 7. Who's bike is this? Get used to the balance point of your bike. Upright it can balance on its own. Get a feel for this practicing in your garage or parking space on level ground. Then find out where the zone of no return is. To do this, hold onto the handlebar/grips and slowly (Very slowly!) ease/ tilt the bike

away from the side of your body until the point where you feel you can no longer hold the bike upright. Of course don't go beyond this. This helps you discover to point of no return zone. Getting a feel for your bike and its "weight character" (top-heavy, front end heavy etc.) will help and eventually allow you to maneuver it eventually with just one hand. Even a 600lb touring motorcycle will feel light at its balanced point. East Valley member Mike Turngren makes this look easy, I think he got this from Richard Dalton.

But wait there is more!

- 8. Thats it turn baby turn! Walking your motorcycle in straight line, like riding it, is easy. Turning requires slightly more modification. Remember to look up and to where you want to be. Again, lean the mass of the bike, the middle area against your body (depending on the type of motorcycle you have) with minimal stress on the handlebars. If you need to turn the bike sharply say to the left; turn the handlebars left to full lock position while stationary/not moving. Turning the steering to full lock will also provide stability. Always stop before turning the handlebars from straight to full lock and back again. The points in between are where the bike is most unstable. Remember, don't apply the front brake when turning to the right. This will lock the steering and cause you to lose control and possibly drop the bike.
- 9. Come on back here where ya going? Simply keep the bike leaned against you and exert a bit more pulling power on the handlebars. Use your hip/upper leg again to drive power into the seat and backwards. Be sure to turn your head and look where you're going. Another method is to hold the bike by the left handlebar with your left hand, and put your right hand on the rear seat, top box or passenger seat handle to push. Though remember while doing this you will have

no control of the brake so be sure you're on level ground. Big tip of the day,,ready? it's often better to move forward and make a little circle rather than backing up.

You forget the side stand and boom! Might I just add this to the mix,

Some use their side stand as a pivot, transferring weight onto the side stand to turn the bike around. This might look cool but it's hard on your side stand and could even bend it. Your side stand is really not meant to take that much weight. Thinking long-term, a motorcycle without a side stand is a bigger problem for a rider! This may also drive a whole into the surface you're turning on.

Walking with power can be done easily and may be needed if moving the bike into a trailer of up a hill where you've not enough strength for the task. Turn the bike on and ride the clutch at the friction zone to get a slow steady speed. Keep your right hand ready to use the front brake if needed.

Practice makes perfect so don't be lazy and let your friends move your motorcycle for you or help. If you do, you'll never hone your skills for the task. Even when you're in the midst of walking your motorcycle and a friend jumps in to help it can upset the balance and steering. This could cause you to panic and drop the bike. Learn to do it yourself

You can also use a friend as a spotter/standing nearby for the first couple tries – just in case.

Walking your motorcycle is truly an easy, confident, and professional way of moving or walking your motorcycle around. Take it easy and go slow. Once you gain your confidence and technique, there's be no type, size or weight of motorcycle you won't be able to manage.
