Senate Hearing - Highly Automated Vehicles: Federal Perspectives on the Deployment of Safety Technology Today the U.S. Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation held a hearing entitled Highly Automated Vehicles: Federal Perspectives on the Deployment of Safety Technology. This hearing comes on the heels of a National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) board meeting yesterday regarding the investigation of a March 2018 crash of

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an Uber Autonomous Vehicle (AV) that resulted in the death of a pedestrian in Tempe, Arizona.

The NTSB released some startling revelations in their investigation of the 2018 deadly crash. Among those that the software did not properly identify the victim as a pedestrian, it did not adequately assess safety risks and the operator of the vehicle was watching a TV show on her phone and was not watching the road. Additionally, the NTSB cited an "inadequate safety culture" at Uber.

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) applauds the NTSB and the U.S. Senate for holding public hearings on AV technology and safety concerns. The MRF is committed to fighting for the safety of motorcyclists as this new technology is deployed on our nation's roadways. While we are hopeful that this

technology can reduce accidents on our nation's roads, we agree with the statement of Chairman Roger Wicker (R-MS) when he said of AV technology "I think a healthy degree of skepticism is a good thing."

During today's Senate hearing, it was especially important that two U.S. Senators specifically addressed the concerns of motorcyclists during the hearing. In a question directed to Joel Szabat, Acting Under Secretary of Transportation for Policy, U.S. Department of Transportation Senator John Thune (R-SD) asked, "In developing a regulatory framework for AVs can you speak to how other roadways users such as motorcycles are considered?" The Assistant Secretary responded by saying "Motorcyclists are well incorporated in the development of policy in the department."

Senator Gary Peters (D-MI) echoed Senator Thune's interest in motorcycles when he said, "I am avid motorcyclist. The number one reason for accidents is a car hitting a motorcyclist or a car pulling out in front of a motorcyclist."

Other Senators include Sen. Cantwell (D-WA) raised concerns about the current deployment of AVs without minimum standards from the federal government, "We need some standards."

In response, Robert Sumwalt, Chairman of the NTSB agreed by saying that "Whatever is working now is not working as well as it should." We at the MRF agree that minimum standards should be in place as this new technology becomes more and more prevalent on the roads we all share.

Chairman Sumwalt of the NTSB closed the hearing with this statement, "I think that AV technology holds great promise to improve safety, but it has to be done properly." We at the MRF could not agree more.

MRF President Kirk "Hardtail" Willard stated, "As a motorcyclist it offends me when bureaucrats are discussing various inevitable, emerging vehicle and advanced roadway technologies they default to classifying us as vulnerable and in need some sort of protection. I would rather and especially in the specific case of Autonomous Vehicles we be thoroughly considered and fully recognizable and therefore not needing extra protection. As with anything affecting motorcyclists this is another example where the Motorcycle Riders Foundation will demand we remain a significant part of the strategy for roadway users."

HOUSE INTRODUCES MOTORCY-CLE ADVISORY COUNCIL REAU-THORIZATION ACT

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Today, Congressmen Mike Gallagher (R-WI) along with Reps. Chris Pappas (D-NH), Harley Rouda (D-CA), and Troy Balderson (R-OH) introduced bipartisan legislation, Motorcycle Advisory Council Reauthorization Act. The bill reauthorizes the Motorcycle Advisory Council (MAC) for six years and ensures national motorcycle organizations regain seats on the council.

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF), along with our partners ABATE of Wisconsin, ABATE of Ohio, Harley-Davidson, and American Motorcyclist Association, have been hard at work over the past month ensuring the future MAC

membership is representative of the riding community. This legislation clarifies the membership of MAC which now will include five highway engineering experts from state or local governments, one state or local traffic safety engineer who is a motorcyclist, one roadway safety data expert on crash testing and analysis, and one representative from each of the following groups: a national association of state transportation officials, a national motorcyclist foundation, a national motorcycle manufacturing association, and a national safety organization.

"As the feds address the vast roadway infrastructure issues and emerging technologies surrounding vehicles and roads, there isn't a more appropriate time to reestablish the Motorcycle Advisory Council," said Kirk "Hardtail" Willard, President of the Motorcycle Riders Foundation. "It was originally and effectively designed to give motorcyclists a voice with regards to the unique challenges we face on two and three wheels when it comes to roadway design."

The MRF is encouraged that this legislation will ensure that motorcyclists will continue to have an open dialogue with government officials about the unique characteristics and challenges that motorcyclists face when they are not adequately considered or accounted for as infrastructure programs are being discussed and implemented. We want to acknowledge and commend the relationships that our state motorcyclist rights organizations (SMROs), specifically ABATE of Wisconsin and ABATE of Ohio, established with their elected officials through attending events such as our annual lobby day, Bikers Inside the Beltway. This event, along with active engagement with members of Congress in their home districts, helps the MRF identify the champions of motorcycle issues and achieve our goals.

"We are pleased that our elected representatives from the state of Wisconsin continue to lead the charge in advocating on behalf of the motorcyclists in the country," said Steve Panten, Legislative Director for ABATE of Wisconsin, Inc. "I am encouraged that years of building relationships, both in our State and by coming to Washington, D.C., every year, continues to elevate our issues on Capitol Hill. We urge other SMRO's to take the opportunity to do the same."

The MAC, initially authorized in the SAFETEA-LU in 2005, allotted four of the ten members to consist of representatives from the motorcycling community

from various state and federal motorcycle associations. In the FAST Act of 2015, Congress re-established the Motorcyclist Advisory Council in the Highway Bill to advise the Federal Highway Administration on "issues of concern to motorcyclists." However, the MRF was disappointed the re-established MAC only included one seat for a representative of a national motorcycle organization.

The Motorcycle Advisory Council provides the Secretary of the Department of Transportation (DOT), the Administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), and the Administrator of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) with expert firsthand knowledge of motorcycle issues. "Motorcycle registration is at an all-time high, but this increasing popularity has brought with it increasing risks, such as fatal accidents," said Rep. Gallagher. "Motorcycles require specific – and in some cases different – requirements of roads, and we need an open dialogue between the motorcycle community, infrastructure experts, and the federal government to discuss these challenges." The MAC serves as the only official forum for the motorcycle community to have an open dialogue with the federal government to discuss concerns with infrastructure design, issues with intelligent transportation systems, and other areas of safety affecting motorcycles on the road.

"With the number of motorcycles currently on the road, it is critical that the road designers and transportation engineers understand the way that motorcycles and motorcyclists interact with the roadways as well as other vehicles using those same roads," said Ed Schetter, Executive Director for ABATE of Ohio, Inc. "Motorcyclists need to be present to help recognize those needs and ensure that motorcycles maintain their place on the road and can be safely operated into a future where technology is creating more and more challenges."

NCOM BIKER NEWSBYTES Compiled & Edited by Bill Bish, National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM)

BIPARTISAN HOUSE BILL WOULD REAUTHORIZE MOTORCYCLIST ADVISORY COUNCIL

"Motorcycles require specific-and in some cases different-requirements of roads, and we need an open dialogue between the motorcycle community, infrastructure experts, and the federal government to discuss these challenges, said U.S. Rep. Mike Gallagher (R-WI) upon sponsoring the bipartisan Motorcycle Advisory Council Reauthorization Act, H.R. 5234.

Rep. Gallagher, alongside Reps. Chris Pappas (D-NH), Troy Balderson (R-OH), and Harley Rouda (D-CA), introduced H.R. 5234 in the U.S. House of Representatives on November 21, 2019 to direct the U.S. Secretary of Transportation to reauthorize the Motorcyclist Advisory Council (MAC) at the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) for six years. The MAC, whose authorization under the FAST Act of 2015 expires along with surface transportation programs in FY2021, provides DOT with critical firsthand knowledge on infrastructure and road safety measures and serves as the only official forum for motorcyclists to discuss motorcycle issues with the federal government.

H.R. 5234, if enacted, would require the volunteer body to submit reports to DOT every two years. DOT then would have 60 days to review the council's recommendations and submit a report to Congress.

The measure would also clarify the membership of MAC "to include 12 members, including 5 highway engineering experts from state or local governments, 1 state or local traffic safety engineer who is a motorcyclist, one roadway safety data expert on crash testing and analysis, and 1 representative from each of the following groups: a national association of State transportation officials, a national motorcyclist foundation, a national motorcyclist association, a national motorcycle manufacturing association, and a national safety organization."

CONGRESS CONSIDERS CAPPING ETHANOL CONTENT OF U.S. FUEL SUPPLY

U.S. Senator Tom Udall (D-NM) and U.S. Representative Peter Welch (D-VT) introduced companion bills in the U.S. Senate and U.S. House of Representatives on November 14, 2019 "to reform the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) by mitigating harmful environmental impacts of the corn ethanol mandate and advancing the next generation of biofuels that actually reduce greenhouse gas emissions," according to a press release issued by Sen. Udall's office.

The GREENER Fuels Act (Growing Renewable Energy through Existing and New Environmentally Responsible Fuels Act) would phase out the corn ethanol mandate and immediately reduce the amount of ethanol in fuel by as much as 1 billion gallons by capping the amount of ethanol that can be blended into conventional gasoline at 9.7 percent.

Such legislation is important to motorcycle riders, in particular, because none of the nation's 22 million motorcycles and ATVs are certified by the EPA to operate on gasoline that contains more than 10% ethanol (E10), and using fuel containing greater than 10% ethanol can damage fuel systems and violate manufacturers' warranties.

MOTORCYCLING GOOD FOR MIND AND BODY

In a fresh take on a previous UCLA study we reported on earlier this year, visordown.com reports that "A study conducted by the Institute of Neuroscience and Human Behavior (INHB) has concluded that motorcyclists are less stressed and more fulfilled than their four-wheeled counterparts," adding that "The study originally set about trying to find out if bikers were constantly riding in fear of being involved in an accident, but inadvertently proved the opposite! The results center around a certain hormone called cortisol that is released in the brain when we become anxious. Scientists

found that bikers would produce 28% less cortisol during testing than drivers on the same course."

The study was conducted by the Semel Institute for Neuroscience and Human Behavior at the University of California, Los Angeles, in a controlled manner, with 50 motorcyclists and 50 car drivers making their way around a closed course for 20-minutes. During this time, the team measured the user's heart rate, cortisol, and adrenaline levels, as well as the user's brain activity, and it's here where the most interesting results came from:

"The results found that when riding, the subjects experienced increased sensory focus and resilience to distraction. Riding also produced an increase in adrenaline levels and heart rate, and a decrease in cortisol levels -- the kind of results you often get after a light exercise session, which also is a stress reducer."

Concluding that motorcycles are better for you physically, as well as mentally, visordown.com claims; "The news regarding the mental well-being of motorcyclists goes hand-in-hand with a study that found that riding a motorcycle can burn anywhere between 170-600 calories an hour. As much as some people can burn in an hour at the gym."

#### NEW YORK POTHOLE MEASURE VETOED

Despite passing both chambers of the New York State legislature, including a unanimous 62-0 vote in the state Senate, Governor Andrew Cuomo (D) has vetoed a measure that would have provided strong incentives for more prompt repairs of road defects by expanding the state's liability for damages suffered by road users due to roadway defects, if the state Department of Transportation was notified of the defect and failed to repair it.

Under current law, motorists who suffer damage due to defects on local roads may pursue damages against the locality at any time during the year so long as the municipality had advance notice of the defect, but those who suffer damages due to defects in state roads may pursue these damages against the state only if the incident occurred between May 15 and November 15. A.1235, sponsored by Assemblyman Thomas J. Abinanti (D-Westchester County), and S.5422, sponsored by state Sen. Timothy M. Kennedy (D-Buffalo), would have expanded state liability for potholes on state highways year-round.

Potholes and roadway defects can not only be dangerous to drivers but can prove deadly for motorcyclists, but Gov. Cuomo, who rides and has promoted state tourism aboard his Harley-Davidson, vetoed the legislation on November 25, 2019. Similar measures, endorsed by the Automobile Association of America and the state Trial Lawyers Association, were proposed in 2014, 2015-16 and 2017-18, but never made it out of committee.

#### ANOTHER STATE INSTITUTES THREE-WHEEL "AUTOCYCLE" RECLASSIFICATION

A new "Autocycle" classification will allow consumers to operate a Polaris Slingshot with a standard driver's license in the state of Wisconsin. Residents of Wisconsin can now operate the threewheeled Slingshot with a standard driver's license, rather than the previously required motorcycle license or endorsement. The reclassification will take effect immediately.

With a steering wheel and side-by-side

seating, state policymakers recognize Slingshot's operator skills mirror those required for a valid state driver's license rather than a motorcycle license and as such, the need for the unique Autocycle classification.

The Slingshot is now classified as an Autocycle in 44 states, including all states bordering Wisconsin. Three states classify the Slingshot as a motorcycle, which requires a motorcycle endorsement or license; Alaska, Massachusetts and New York.

#### MINNESOTA CITY SEEKS PUBLIC INPUT TO RIDE AN ATV ON CITY STREETS

The Superior, Minnesota city council is considering a referendum on ATV use, and is seeking public input to determine whether or not it should be legal for ATVs and side-by-sides in the city.

According to a report on SuperiorTelegram.com, a council member has "introduced a resolution that would place an advisory referendum on the April 7, 2020 ballot to gauge public sentiment for allowing ATVs and UTVs to use any city street except those deemed exempt because of state and local laws or safety concerns," and may let voters decide if all city streets and alleys could be open to use by all-terrain and utilitytask vehicles.

The Superior City Council wouldn't be bound to act based on the outcome of the election, but if the measure is well-supported by the public, the councilman would introduce an ordinance to that

#### NEW HAMPSHIRE RESISTS EXIT RENUMBERING

United States highways have been switching to one consistent exit numbering system over the years, and in most states exits now share their number with their closest mile marker, making it simpler for travelers to locate their position and estimate distances between where they are and where they're going.

A few northeastern states have been slow to switch, however, and New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu (R) believes that holding onto the old sequential exit numbers for the sake of tradition is more

important than progress and consistency.

But the renumbering decision isn't entirely up to the individual states, as the federal government has threatened to withhold federal highway funding from states that do not comply with the directive to reassign exit numbers by mileage.

On Twitter, Governor Sununu said, "Exit numbers are a point of pride for some of us in NH -- and we shouldn't let Washington bureaucrats threaten to take that away!"

Numbering exits by mileage is what the rest of the country does, and those few remaining states holding out should probably do the same for consistency for travelers everywhere, though admittedly, this has become less of an issue now that most vehicles, even motorcycles, have GPS capability and can make better decisions based on better information.

#### TASMANIA BANS THE WEARING OF "OUTLAW MOTORCYCLE GANG" INSIGNIAS

Laws banning the wearing of insignias of five "Outlaw Motorcycle Gangs (OMCG)" has gone into force in Tasmania (an island state of Australia), and their majority Liberal Government "makes no apologies for being tough on criminals and is delivering on our strong plan to keep Tasmania safer from organised crime.

The legislation "applies to an organisation that displays prohibited insignias that causes the public to feel intimidated and threatened," and their new laws relate to five OMCGs -- Bandidos, Outlaws, Devils Henchmen, Black Uhlans and Rebels, which officials say "sends a clear message that crime gangs are not welcome in Tasmania.'

### Accident Rate Continues To Drop On US Roads

Despite more vehicles on the road than ever before, the number of accidents in the US continues to drop.

America's roads growing safer, even as states push speed limits as high as 85 MPH. The US Department of Transportation last month counted 6.7 million accidents reported by police in 2018 -- a 2.4 percent drop even as the number of vehicles on the road surpassed the all-time record.

"New vehicles are safer than older ones

and when crashes occur, more new vehicles are equipped with advanced technologies that prevent or reduce the severity of crashes," National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Acting Administrator James Owens explained in a statement.

In 2018, there were 1.13 fatalities for every 100 million vehicle miles traveled, compared to 1.17 in 2017 -- a 3.4 percent reduction. Preliminary 2019 numbers are even better, with a fatality rate of 1.06 posted for the first half of the year. Fatality figures are from the agency's fatality database, which contains the most reliable statistics. Numbers for injury and property damage accidents come from

NHTSA's recently revamped crash sampling database that makes nationwide estimates based on a representative sampling of police reports. The system estimated 1.9 million injury crashes and 4.8 million property damage collisions, which combined with 33,654 fatalities for a total of 6.7 million incidents. Accidents that only result in property damage accounted for 71 percent of accidents.

"There was a statistically significant increase in property damage only crashes from 2017 to 2018," NHTSA's research note explained. "This increase is primarily related to changes in property damage reporting criteria at some data collection sites."

Several states stopped allowing police to report the estimated damage from a crash as "unknown," a change that results in more incidents being recorded as a reportable crash.

Figures from the NHTSA database also show that in 2018, there were 492 fatal rear end collisions at intersections in 2018. Supporters of red light cameras often downplay the seriousness of rear end collisions as "minor fender benders" since the use of automated enforcement is known to increase the number of rear end accidents (view studies). About 65,000 accidents nationwide involved buses.

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
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

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### From The Board Room

2020 is here with new state officers and new goals and I am very optimistic about ABATE of AZ and its mission. The mission to protect our rights to ride (Ride Free) and to improve safety (Ride Safe) for all motorcyclists continues for all riders, , no matter what you ride, or where. Dirt, touring, street, cruiser, or trike; we are working for you.

But what exactly does Ride Free mean? And what exactly does Ride Safe mean?

Ride Free means to be able to ride unencumbered by regulations and laws that don't make any sense or that infringe on your right to ride what you want, where you want, wearing whatever you want. Of course, we encourage good citizenship so these things have to be realistic. But then, we demand the same from those who would impinge on those rights. Like everything else in modern society, creating a line in the sand (any line in any sand really) tends to cause some level of conflict and so ABATE of AZ maintains a committed and vigilant lobbying capability to protect our rights in all legislative matters. But, at the end of the day, we just want to be left alone to ride our machines on the best, most scenic, highways and trails that Arizona offers the world.

Ride Safe means that at the end of the ride, we come home uninjured. Pretty

simple until you think about it. In order for Arizona's riders (or our visitors who ride) to come home uninjured, we need them well-trained, riding safe bikes, on safe roads. However, we also need those with whom we share the roads and trails to ALSO be well-trained, driving safe equipment, on safe roads.

So how are we achieving these goals?

Over the past few years, ABATE of AZ has built a powerful and productive legislative arm to keep an eye on proposed legislation, and even to propose legislation where it seems there is a need. In some cases, our lobbyists fight for our rights. In others, they pursue laws to make the roads safer. In 2019 ABATE of AZ has been sharing ideas with the Governor's Office of Highway Safety and we expect to expand that relationship by working more closely with that office in the years to come. ABATE of AZ also has a Motorcycle Awareness Program that teaches new (and soon, we hope,

existing) drivers the need, and methods, to look out for motorcycles. Recently we have started working more closely with AMSAF to help in their efforts to train new motorcycle riders through their scholarship program. And we are helping them to advertise their new helmet subsidy program for those riders that choose to wear a helmet. All of these efforts, and more, will continue through 2020.

And remember, whether you ride a motorcycle, trike, or cage, when it comes to Arizona's streets, highways and trails, WE ARE ALL RIDERS!








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### **IDENTIFY YOUR REPRESENTATIVES**

In a totalitarian dictatorship, you need to know who is in charge because you need to watch your back (and besides, there are usually a lot of statues and pictures to constantly remind you that you are subjugated). In the United States, you can fail your civics class in high school and not be put in jail or asked to leave the country. You don't even have to vote in our country if you don't want

Let's start at the top. There are some things that only the federal government can do. Declaring war, negotiating treaties, regulating foreign trade, printing money, and providing for the national defense are all policy areas reserved for the federal government.

Our state government has a few distinct issue areas as well. It regulates our elections, driver's licenses, and property taxes. Beyond that, assigning issue areas to specific levels of government quickly gets murky.

One of the pressures that muddies the playing field of issues between multiple levels of government is that elected officials have to run for office every so often. Most of the time, those candidates want to know what is going on in your neighborhood and what issues are important to you.

## THINGS YOU WANT TO KNOW ABOUT YOUR ELECTED OFFICIALS

There is some basic information that you need to know about your elected officials. I am limiting this lesson to just our state legislature. If you do not know who your elected official is, you can go to https://www.azleg.gov/findmylegislator/ and find out.

You will need to record not only their name but also the name and titles of any staff who work for them. Remember that it is the administrative assistant who is the gatekeeper for our state legislators. It's a good piece of advice to get to know them and be nice to them.

This is the info sheet I keep on ALL of our elected officials.

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## How Oakland's first African-American motorcycle club helped inspire a new TV show

"So I'm from the San Francisco Bay Area, and I just kind of thought, well, what do I know?" showrunner Nichelle Tramble Spellman ("The Good Wife," "Justified") explained during Apple TV+'s press junket for "Truth Be Told," the newest drama to hit the fledgling streamer's lineup.

What does Spellman know? A lot, to be honest. And, while "Truth Be Told" examines the impact of media on public opinion and the ripple effect true crime leaves in its wake, the showrunner delves deeper, using the character of Poppy Parnell (played by Oscar-winner Octavia Spencer) as an in-road to pay homage to her real-life hometown, Oakland. In the show, she examines big topics, like the class differences that exist in cities separated by a few simple bridges, and tells stories based on the nonfictional locals, like the real-life storied motorcycle club, the East Bay Dragons.

Parnell is a fictional journalist who begins questioning her role in the incarceration of Warren Cave (Aaron Paul). As her posh lifestyle and public reputation get threatened, demons from Parnell's past bubble up, leading Parnell to venture to her old Oakland stomping grounds. Spellman found this locale to be perfect for reminiscing on her childhood, in effect highlighting the profound influence a long-running regional African American motorcycle club, the East Bay Dragons MC, had on her forming identity.

as Legal Counsel for the Confederation of Clubs.

Now in its 60th year of existence, the East Bay Dragons are one of America's first-ever all-black motorcycle clubs. The group, which initially started out as a car club in the late 1950s, rides customized Harley Davidson motorcycles (also known as choppers) and is a well-loved fixture of West Oakland. In "Truth Be Told," Spellman illustrates the juxtaposition of that kind of East Bay and North Bay life.

"I like the idea of driving across the [Golden Gate] Bridge," she says. "So it's just like, you know, money Marin and then you go over [the Bay Bridge] and it's funkier, more bluesy Oakland. So we played with that, visually. When we're at the family bar, it looks different than it does in Marin, where it's very crisp. The music and the soundtrack are different ... just to kind of show all the facets of this one character with Octavia."

Part of Parnell's character is rooted in her father's life. Parnell's father Leander "Shreve" Scoville, played by "This Is Us" star Ron Cephas Jones, is a former Black Panther who has put all his energy into family — both his biological one as well as his thriving biker community which, according to Spellman, is directly inspired by the East Bay Dragons.

"I remember them fondly as a little girl because they used to have this black family day picnic every year up in Nolan Park, and that was huge," Spellman explained. "You look forward to it all year. So they were like all these tough biker guys and everything else, with all these kids around and it was a big Bay

Area event and they were kind of the backdrop of my childhood."

The East Bay Dragons formed in 1959, during a time when the image of a black man riding a motorcycle could provoke a strong reaction. They nevertheless built up a positive reputation in the neighborhood, supporting the Oakland area while giving voice to the oppressed during a time before the civil rights movement really took off. Their friendship with the Black Panthers may have caused confusion for law enforcement, oftentimes putting the bikers in contention with police, but that bond placed the crew in the spotlight which energized members of the East Bay community.

The MC previously inspired the fictional motorcycle club The Grim Bastards in Kurt Sutter's wildly popular FX series, "Sons of Anarchy." However, the representation of the biker group featured in the new Apple TV+ series feels further developed. Instead of getting a passing look at Sutter's all-black biker gang, "Truth Be Told" gives audiences a nuanced understanding of the familial connection this motorcycle club has with Parnell. That conflicted bond she has with her father and his crew makes this story component resonate. They aren't called The East Bay Dragons in the show, but the group inspired by the real-life MC deeply anchors the plot.

For Jones, playing the biker and bar owner not only provided him a fully developed character to sink his teeth into — something he refers to as "a dream role" — the subject matter helped him tap into his own New Jersey upbringing.


into motorcycling by being the sole financial sponsor of the National Coalition of Motorcyclists.

"I grew up with the same exact story, and there were the same black biker movements going on," he revealed. "My dad had a little bodega restaurant in Paterson, New Jersey, and he would keep it open because there was a bar across the street where they all would congregate and celebrate. There would be black bikers from all over the country that would drive all the way to the East Coast. I remember staying up late making hamburgers and hot dogs for these cats into the wee hours of the morning to feed these guys after they would come from the club."

"Soul on Bikes," a book written by East Bay Dragons' founding member Tobie Levingston, provided insight for both Spellman and Cephas Jones, who acknowledge their shared memories of the club as all positive. And for an MC, especially one featuring all black men during a notorious time of civil unrest in America, the representation given to this East Bay community is an uncommon one. Add in the cultural differences between regions separated by a few simple bridges, and Spellman found a personal formula that ticked off all the narrative boxes for her.

"I hadn't seen it on screen and I just thought it was such an interesting flavor to add," Spellman continued. "Meeting the Poppy character, and if we stayed with her an entire episode just in that environment in Marin, you would just have no idea."

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

### Recall: Rear Brakes On Harley Trikes Could Activate On Their Own

A software issue poses a safety hazard.

The NHTSA has issued a recall by Harley-Davidson on three models of trikes that could potentially present a software issue that could cause the rear brakes to activate on their own. Here are the details.

Harley-Davidson Motor Company has issued a recall on over 12,500 trikes in the United States for a potential brake problem due to a faulty software. The

company estimates that roughly one percent of the 12,624 recalled units are actually affected by the problem. The models targeted by this recall are:

2019-2020 Harley-Davidson FLHT-CUTG (Classic Ultra Tri Glide)

2020 Harley-Davidson FLHTCUTGSE (CVO Tri Glide)

2019-2020 Harley-Davidson FLRT (Freewheeler)

The three models of Harley trike are equipped with an electro-hydraulic control unit (EHCU) that manages the Trike Traction Control System. The company

found that the EHCU could present an error and cause the traction control to respond incorrectly to a faulty rear-wheel speed signal. This could lead to one of the rear brakes to engage on its own and cause the trike to suddenly change direction. The loss of control that could result from it could ultimately cause a crash.

The Harley-Davidson dealers should already be aware of the issue and letters to the owners affected have been sent at the beginning of December. Owners are invited to make an appointment with their Harley-Davidson dealer to have their trike checked. Should the vehicle present

the software issue, the system will be updated which should eliminate the error. The service will be provided free of charge.

Should they have any questions or concerns, owners of one of the models involved in the recall are invited to call the Harley-Davidson customer service line at 1-800-258-2464 to have their VIN verified. The company's internal number for this recall is 0175. Customers are also welcome to address their inquiries to the NHTSA's hotline service at 1-888-327-4236.

### Hayley Bell named American Motorcyclist Association 2019 Motorcyclist of the Year

U.K. rider founded Women Riders World Relay, helped unite motorcyclists worldwide

Bell is the founder and president of global business development for the Women Riders World Relay, a movement joined by thousands of motorcyclists from 84 countries to create a "global sisterhood of inspirational women" and to demonstrate to motorcycle manufacturers and makers of riding gear that female riders are a formidable and growing market that deserves their attention.

The AMA Motorcyclist of the Year designation, awarded annually by the AMA Board of Directors, recognizes the individual or group that had the most profound impact on the world of motorcycling in the previous 12 months.

"For her efforts to promote the motorcycle lifestyle around the world and bring together riders from all nations and backgrounds, conveying the positive aspects of motorcycling and drawing attention to the market potential of female riders, Hayley Bell is the 2019 AMA Motorcyclist of the Year," said Maggie McNally-Bradshaw, chair of the AMA Board of Directors. "Women riders are an important segment of the motorcycling community and they are a critical building block for the future. Hayley's efforts not only reaffirm that sentiment, but they help carry it forward at a time when motorcycling needs new riders in the fold."

Women Riders World Relay participants carried the relay baton for a leg of the journey through their countries, then passed it along to the next group of riders. The relay brought together women from diverse cultures and bridged political differences, even across national borders.

Bell was determined that the Women Riders World Relay demonstrate that female riders "are exactly equal to other riders." Along the way, the relay drew support and participation from male riders, as well.
