

I was taken by surprise recently when I mentioned SMART goals in a meeting and several people did not know what I was talking about. I really thought that SMART goals had become somewhat of a buzzword in the professional arena, and certainly something that everyone was at least kind of familiar with. You see, by implementing SMART goals into parts of my own life, it is no wonder why people don't follow through with their goals. Without a sense of direction or accountability, goals are easily abandoned without a second thought. It is not surprising that research shows that 80% of new year's resolutions are forgotten by February 15th.

Back in the early 90s I listened to an interview with NFL Hall of Fame running back Emmitt

too small to play high school football, but you broke records. You were too small to play Division I SEC football, but you got a scholarship and broke records. You were too small to play in the NFL and here you are as league and Super Bowl MVP and champion. How did you do that?" Smith replied, "It was always my dream to do all those things." I tell people repeatedly that the ability to get good legislation passed is ALL about strategy. Making your plan and working the strategy in the most effective way possible. SMART goals.

Dr. King said, "I have a dream". Well so do I. I have so many dreams for ABATE of Arizona and how we can be a positive driving force for motorcyclists in Arizona. I have shared some of those dreams with our state officers and board of directors. I want to share a few of these with you now.

ABATE active membership at 1,000 before the end of 2021. This is easy to do. We have that many on our rolls now if we can just get people to renew their memberships. Get three good pieces of legislation passed. While we have more than that planned for the

year, I am making a conservative goal of just three GOOD pieces of legislation. Over 500 motorcyclists in attendance for Motorcycle Day at the Dome. Since we have been hovering between 350 and 375 the past few years, 500 is an attainable goal. Raise the endorsed rider percentage above 50%. Right now, according to ADOT, we are only about 40% of riders with a valid motorcycle endorsement. I have been discussing this with AMSAF director Mick Degn, and we will be working towards this together. Help start two new ABATE chapters by the end of 2021. That will bring us to 9 in our state. Ten if you count the at-large members. Facilitate a town hall event with legislators for every chapter. I want our legislators to get to know the local chapters and not just see my

Have a strong trained grassroots advocate team in each chapter. This will allow each chapter to advocate on the local municipal level when needed. Remember that all politics is local. -Tip O'Neill

There are my seven goals for 2021 for ABATE as your Legislative Director. I want to challenge every one of you to participate in one of those in your chapter. I will be attending the chapter meetings throughout the year, as COVID permits, to share more with you. I want to welcome you to share your ideas on how we can achieve these together.

Here is to a successful and exciting 2021.

### **News from the MRF**

#### FCC Spectrum Band Vote

Last week the Federal Communications Commission voted 5-0 on a controversial measure that opens up spectrum band previously reserved solely for automakers. Spectrum is the range of electromagnetic radio frequencies used to transmit sound, data, and video across the country. For over 20 years a specific band of spectrum was reserved for automotive safety. The hope being that automakers would develop technology allowing cars to communicate with one another, thus creating safer roadways.

The fight surrounding the allocation of this spectrum pitted cable companies like Comcast on one side vs automakers and the U.S. Department of Transportation on the other.

U.S. House of Representatives
Transportation Committee chairman,
Peter DeFazio, called the decision "a gift
to corporate interests at the expense of
public safety," adding it "will undermine
decades of development and over a billion public dollars that the transportation
community has invested in these technologies."

During the legislative session at the Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) Meeting of the Minds in September, ABATE of Illinois made a strong pitch to other state motorcycle rights organizations that this spectrum issue would impact the safety of motorcyclists nation-

wide. Following the lead of ABATE of Illinois, MRF membership voted unanimously to add the spectrum band issue to our list of "2021 High Priority Objectives." The official stance of the MRF is to "Protect the set aside radio spectrums necessary for Dedicated Short-Range Communications (DSRC) vehicle to vehicle communications."

We will continue to follow the issue and work with like-minded organizations to protect the safety of our roads. Thank you to ABATE of Illinois for their vigilance on this issue.

### **Public Comments Sought on Autonomous Vehicles**

As we at the MRF know, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has taken a voluntary approach to autonomous vehicles (AVs)

without standards and regulations. This hands-off approach has worried motorcyclists, by allowing the private sector to deploy AVs with little or no oversight.

Last week NHTSA changed course slightly and asked for public input on a proposed regulation of autonomous vehicle sensors, how the vehicles detect other road users and infrastructure, how they plan routes and how they carry out that plan.

"This rulemaking will help address legitimate public concerns about safety, security and privacy without hampering innovation in the development of automated driving systems," said Transportation Secretary Elaine Chao.

Once the notice is printed in the Federal Register, the public will have 60 days to comment on proposed regulations. Before the deadline, the MRF will draft a response to NHTSA outlining the concerns of motorcyclists and now government agencies can ensure motorcyclists are accounted for in the development and deployment of this new technology.

### Harley-Davidson LiveWire versus Zero SR/S

#### Range and recharging

How far you can go and how long it takes to recharge are two considerations that require some scrutiny with electric motorcycles, far beyond what you have to do with an ICE motorcycle. With the LiveWire and the SR/S, I found some similarities and some key differences.

Zero claims a max range of 161 miles for the SR/S (in the city) and Harley-Davidson specs the LiveWire's max urban range at 145 miles. There's a high degree of variability in how far you can actually ride on one of these high-performance electric motorcycles, however, depending on which riding mode you use and the type of riding you do, and that exposes an ongoing drawback of electric versus gas motorcycles.

Putting either in high power mode and heading out on the highway makes for a pretty short trip. Testing these two electric motorcycles (and others), I've found you get the most out of them by riding in efficiency mode most of the time — which still offers a good deal of zip —

switching to Sport when the occasion arises and then switching back to Range or Eco modes to conserve power.

Following that modus operandi, the LiveWire and SR/S were pretty evenly matched, and offered around 85 to 100 miles of range per charge, on my mix of roughly 25 percent city riding, 45 percent curvy two-lane and 30 percent highway cruising.

An important difference is revealed when it's time to recharge these two motorcycles. Zero and Harley took different approaches and that may determine which bike works better for how and where you ride

Level 1 charging is plugging the bike into a regular home outlet. Level 2 charging stations basically double that power. Level 3, also called DC Fast Charging, uses DC instead of AC power. DC fast charging stations provide the quickest way to replenish any EV that's equipped to handle it.

Charging the LiveWire

The LiveWire charges faster than the SR/S — assuming you find a compatible Level 3 charging station. If you're charging either motorcycle from a regular wall outlet, it's an all-day (or overnight) wait.

The SR/S Premium accommodates Level 1 or Level 2 charging. The LiveWire gives the rider the options of Level 1 or Level 3 and free Level 3 charging is available for two years at Chargepoint stations at all Harley-Davidson dealerships that sell the LiveWire.

Using a Level 3 fast charger, the LiveWire can charge to 80 percent of battery capacity in 40 minutes and reach 100 percent in roughly an hour. The Zero SR/S Premium charged to 100 percent in around 90 minutes, using a Level 2 charger. Charging either bike at Level 1 on a home outlet happened at a snail's pace.

I clocked it at 11 hours for a charge after I ran the big HD's battery down to two percent state of charge. Basically, Level 1 charging is for when the bike is parked overnight or maybe at your workplace, if your employer lets you plug in while

you're on the job.

The Harley's faster Level 3 charging sounds great, but the advantage is not so clear cut. Only 15 percent of public charging outlets in the United States are Level 3 DC Fast Charging Stations, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. Plus, you have to make sure the DC fast charging station has the SAE Combined Charging System (CCS) plug to match your LiveWire.

What does all this mean for this comparison? With the SR/S Premium, I could charge relatively quickly from a lot of charging stations. With the LiveWire I could charge faster but at far fewer locations.

For riders who plan to ride further than the range a full battery provides, the availability of charging stations is an important consideration. Electric motorcycles still require riders to accept a high degree of inconvenience over gas-powered bikes in how far you can ride and the time it takes to top up your scooter.

### Triumph Trident 660 and Tiger 850 Sport Reach U.S. Shores

British bike maker Triumph had a host of high-profile premieres this year. The most recent are the Trident 660, the entry bike in the world of Triple roadsters, and the Tiger 850 Sport, it too an entry-level. Neither is presently available at U.S. dealerships, but since that will change in early 2021, the company thought a promotional tour is in order.

Triumph initially planned to show the two

models as part of the New Product Tour events it had planned, but the health crisis forced a change – instead of a tour, a so-called sneak peek is offered on the grounds of dealerships across the U.S.

"With the cancellation of the motorcycles shows, it was an obvious choice for us to get these in the hands of as many dealerships as possible," said in a statement Adam VanderVeen, Marketing Director, Triumph Motorcycles America.

"I was blown away to learn the strong support of the dealerships, including a handful opting to open on Sundays or Mondays they'd usually be closed just to have an extra day to preview these hot new models."

Two pairs of each bike will be trekking the country, hopping from dealership to dealership for what the company calls "a first-hand look." The four motorcycles are, according to Triumph, the only units of their respective ranges currently on display anywhere outside of Europe. And no, they're not available for test rides.

The Trident 660 is powered by a whole new breed of the Triple engine that develops 81 PS (80 hp) at 10,250 rpm and 64

Nm (47 lb-ft) peak torque at 6,250 rpm. It is priced at \$7,995 and should be available in January.

The Tiger 850 Sport packs an 888cc engine rated at 85 PS (84 hp) at 8,500 rpm and 82 Nm (60 lb-ft) of torque at 6,500 rpm. The asking price for this one is \$11,995, and it too should be available starting next month.

The full schedule of dealership stops is available on the bike maker's website.

PANDEMIC KICKSTARTED A MOTORCYCLE BOOM

From soft sales and even negative growth at some companies, to the specter of businesses collapsing in the face of Coronavirus, to sudden sales spikes and even triple-digit growth, 2020 has been a whiplash year for the motorcycle industry.

Prior to the COVID-19 outbreak, red flags were waving in many pockets of motorcycle commerce according to Forbes.com, and there was a growing dark cloud hovering over the industry, generated in large part by one particular problem: Not enough new riders are buying motorcycles and replacing those that are leaving the sport.

"There have been many reasons postulated for the shrinking ridership numbers and flagging sales, from Millennials being more risk (and motorcycle) averse, to smartphone addiction to enthusiasts aging out of the market," wrote Forbes contributor Bill Roberson in his article; "The Motorcycle Industry Was At A Crossroads, Then COVID-19 Changed Up The Map".

When the pandemic hit, something very

interesting happened: Motorcycle and bicycle sales started climbing, often at double-digit rates. "It made sense on some levels, since anyone returning to work or life in general was avoiding ride share and mass transit like the plague (sorry) and many ex-riders suddenly rediscovered their mothballed two-wheeled conveyances - or decided to buy new ones," surmised Roberson, adding that as people began to return to workplaces, suddenly motorcycles, scooters and bicycles became viable options.

Besides being a socially distanced activity anyway, added benefits like discounted tolls, free parking (in non-car spaces) and HOV lane access for motorcycles could help drive even more people to give motorcycles a go.

Also, motorcycle industry insider Robert Pandya told Roberson that many cities experienced an unusual phenomenon unseen in decades: literally no vehicle traffic.

"And the new crop of electric machines, along with the surge in adult-sized small-displacement motorcycle options give perspective riders more to consider than what has long been the primary market focus in the U.S.: selling large displacement, high-margin motorcycles," explains Roberson.

Pandya noted that businesses and repair shops have experienced some "exceptional months."

But while the latest boost is good news, the big question is; can it be sustained? Will the sudden high tide of bike and motorcycle sales result in a renaissance for that kind of personal transportation? "We find ourselves in this industry on our heels, and you can look in the rearview mirror all you want," Pandya told Forbes.com, "but I think the access to technology and design, and our marketing abilities, speaks to this awesome opportunity to go from seven percent [of people riding motorcycles] to eight percent." Just that small of a rise in ridership could be enough to swing the fortunes and future of the motorcycle industry.

U.S. HELMET USE TRENDS HIGHER

Helmet use by U.S. motorcyclists has trended higher over the past decade, according to a new government survey.

According to the U. S. Department of Transportation National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), the National Occupant Protection Use Survey (NOPUS) is the only survey that provides nationwide probability-based observed data on motorcyclist helmet use in the United States.

The NOPUS is conducted by NHTSA on an annual basis and the findings of the survey over the past ten years show a gradually increasing trend in the use of helmets by motorcycle riders.

According to the NHTSA survey, helmet use nationwide increased among motorcyclists from 54.3% of all riders (including passengers) in 2010 to 70.8% in 2019. In states with a mandatory helmet law, helmet use among riders was 89.2% in 2019, while in all other states -- those that only require helmet use for specific riders, helmet use was 56.5%.

On a regional basis in 2019, riders in the West helmeted up most often, with helmet use noted among 83.7% of those observed. The south was next at 74.6%, followed by the northeast region at 74.1%, and the Midwest at only 43.4%.

Having a passenger aboard is an apparent factor in increased helmet use by the driver, with 79.7% of riders wearing a helmet when they have a passenger compared to 74% when riding solo, based on the data for 2019.

#### TEACHING MOTORCYCLES TO **COMMUNICATE**

In an international effort to improve road safety for motorcyclists, a number of motorcycle manufacturers are cooperating to connect motorcycles with other vehicles and infrastructure.

In the Connected Motorcycle Consortium (CMC), motorcycle manufacturers BMW, Honda, KTM and Yamaha work together to develop new standards and techniques to connect motorcycles with other vehicles and infrastructure.

CMC started in 2016, because C-ITS (Cooperative Intelligent Transport System) specifications for passenger cars had not taken motorcycle specific safety factors and challenges into consideration sufficiently. The consortium aims at joining forces between motorcycle manufacturers, suppliers, research institutes and associations, to make motorcycles part of the future connected mobility.

The first goal was to define a first 'basic specification' for motorcycles to connect and 'talk the same language' to other vehicles or infrastructure by means of wireless communication. The next move will be CMC 'NEXT' with a wider scope, as motorcycle experts will be looking at further improvements of the specification while at the same time taking account of new functions supported by on-board sensors both in cars and in motorcycles.

"I am very glad that the motorcycle industry has joined forces to develop these specifications," commented FEMA (Federation of European Motorcyclists' Associations) General Secretary Dolf Willigers, adding that "The new technologies that are involved here will assist the car drivers in their task and by doing so will make the road safer for motorcyclists."

Current developments in the industry offer a glimpse of what a solution by CMC might look like:

~ Smartphones – especially when connected via the upcoming, powerful 5G network – could be a major part of the solution, transmitting information between nearby vehicles.

~ Inspired by military headgear, U.S. manufacturers are designing smart helmets for PTWs, with cameras for traffic in front of and behind the driver and LEDs projecting warnings on the visor. ~ Researchers point to the value of intelligent speed controllers.

A number of manufacturers have already presented various innovations towards a fully operational C-ITS: ~ BMW's ConnectedRide, introduced in 2016, warns bikers when a car comes into the blind spot of their rearview

~ KTM is working on a Blind Spot Detection system, using short-range

Ducati has collaborated with Audi on C-V2X technology warning drivers of a collision when near a crossing or behind a driver who suddenly brakes.

What's missing for now is the required infrastructure, and the regulatory obligation for all vehicles to be equipped with such systems. The European Commission has launched an EU-wide strategy for C-ITS, facilitating investments and exploring the rules required.

#### HONDA PATENTS A MOTORCYCLE THAT'S CONTROLLED BY THE MIND

No, it's not the plot-line from a sci-fi movie, Honda has filed one of the wildest patents of the year, with an idea for a motorcycle that is partly controlled directly by the power of thought!

Of course, all motorcycles are already controlled by the 'power' of the mind the rider 'thinks' and the brain sends messages to our limbs that control the bike – but this latest patent for a "mind control motorcycle" shows that Honda thinks there is a more efficient way to do that, with signals from the brain directly affecting the bike's behavior.

"Honda's wacky idea is not that you think 'left' and the bike steers to the left; this system is more about changing the bike's settings and assistance systems," according to VisorDown.com, going on to explain; "Within the rider's helmet, there are a set of neural sensors that can pick up the stream of thoughts from the rider's brain. The messages are then sent to the bike's onboard computer which deciphers the messages and adjusts the required setting in accordance with the demands of the

#### EURO 5 IS COMING

Despite pleas from the motorcycle industry and European manufacturers to delay implementation until 2022, particularly due to COVID-19 lockdowns, factory shutdowns and supply chain slowdowns, "Euro 5" is due to come into force January 1. 2021, forcing bike makers to meet ever-increasingly stringent emissions regulations worldwide.

As the name suggests, Euro 5 is the fifth set of European standards for motorcycles aimed at reducing air pollutants produced by two-wheelers incrementally over the years since Euro 1 in 1999, and every few years since the standards have tightened. As time goes by, the EU's regulations have grown to include safety systems (ABS, traction control) and other technology

Wonder why two-stroke engines have disappeared, why carburetors have been replaced by electronic fuel injection, or why ABS is becoming standard even on lowly beginner bikes? Thank Euro5 and its predecessors.

Today, either directly or indirectly, European regulations are responsible for many decisions in the development of new motorcycles. Because of how strict the standards are and how influential the European market is to the entire global motorcycle industry, Euro 5 will essentially be the de facto world-

It's easier for the OEMs to make one bike for the whole world, instead of a dozen variations for differing regional regulations.

Euro 5 means we can expect another imminent cull and extensive redesigns as current Euro 4-legal models are revamped or replaced to suit the stricter new tailpipe limits, and air-cooled engines are inevitably threatened each time there's a new bout of emissions

restrictions.

Of course, Euro5 isn't the end, either. In coming years, we'll see Euro5+ enacted; all new models sold after 2025 must meet that even stricter standard. Look for new exhaust regulations, as well as changes to the rules around OBD2 code sensors, and even weight restrictions -- and expect technological advances, to meet all the new rules. The EU's rule changes may be killing off some much-loved models, but they're also forcibly moving the industry forward.

JURY FINDS MYRTLE BEACH RACIALLY DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BLACK BIKERS The city of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, was motivated by race when it created a new traffic plan designed to "suck the fun" out of Black Bike Week, a federal jury has found.

Civil rights groups accused the city of racially discriminating against the Black tourists by treating them differently than white bikers who attend Harley Week earlier each May, citing in particular a 23-mile one-way no-exit traffic chute that funnels them out of town during the peak nights of Atlantic Beach Bikefest, otherwise known as Black Bike Week. The city also puts up barricades and increases its police presence in ways that don't apply to the mostly white bikers during their event, NAACP attorneys said.

The jurors -- five Black and four white -- deliberated for more than three hours before delivering their verdict, on December 10, agreeing that "race was a motivating factor," but they also sided against the black bikers, saying Myrtle Beach probably "would have made the same decision anyway, even if it had not considered race in its official actions regarding Black Bike Week."


#### What is grassroots organizing?


Just two or three people canvassing and speaking out to gain support from likeminded individuals is what it takes to start a grassroots advocacy campaign.

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






"The Steel Shoe Fund is thrilled to host the 2021 AMA Ice Race Grand Championship GP," said Chris DaRonco, the event promoter. "We look forward to providing a challenging 6-plus-mile course on Kettle Moraine Lake. We're working on some exciting changes to our program to make the event better than last year and to comply with any state and local orders regarding COVID-19. We look forward to hosting riders from all over and awarding those highly coveted AMA National number-one plates."

The Steel Shoe Fund was established in 1997 as a nonprofit organization to assist flat-track motorcycle racers who have been seriously injured during competition within the continental United States.

The second event, the High Voltage Ice

Races, takes place February 6 on a halfmile oval at Miller's Bay in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

This is the second year that the High Voltage Ice Races will be sanctioned as an AMA Grand Championship. The event is organized by Ron Brefka of iRon Enterprises, and proceeds go to support pancreatic cancer research. There is no admission fee for spectators, but donations to the We Care Fund are encouraged.


will be supporting cancer research with donations to the We Care Fund for Medical Innovation and Research at the Medical College of Wisconsin."










Boy Chases Lions On Motorcycle In Gir Forest, Arrested After Video Goes Viral

The arrest was made on Wednesday after a video surfaced on social media platforms recently, which showed two lions being chased on a motorcycle.

Two persons, including a boy, were arrested for allegedly harassing two lions in Gir forest of Gujarat by chasing them on a motorcycle, a senior official said on Saturday.

The arrest was made on Wednesday after a video surfaced on social media platforms recently, which showed two lions being chased on a motorcycle by unidentified persons, who scared them away with loud noise of the vehicle and honking, the forest department official said.

"An investigation was launched into the video, which revealed that it was shot near Gadhiya village in Tulsishyam range of Gir East forest division of Gujarat by two locals. One of them was identified as Yunis Pathan, and another a minor," Chief Conservation of Forests (Wildlife), Junagadh, D T Vasavada said.


"While going on their motorcycle, the duo had come across two Asiatic lions. They chased the felines away by honking and creating loud sound through the vehicle. They shot a video of the chase on a mobile phone, which they uploaded on social media sites later," he added.

Pathan, who hails from Sarasiya village in the same locality, was arrested along with the minor under the provisions of the Wildlife Protection Act and was produced before a local court on Friday, which remanded him in judicial custody, Vasavada said.

Decision on further action against the minor is being taken, he added.

The official warned people against indulging in activities like harassing or teasing lions, which he said was a serious offence with a provision for jail term ranging from three years to seven years and Rs 25,000 penalty.

"We have arrested several persons for such offences in the past and are taking stern action. It is not easy to get bail in such matters. I would appeal to the people to refrain from such acts," he said.




























































### **Barbie Hensler Memorial Toy Run**

### Illinois Supreme Court Confirms Existence Of Illegal Traffic Ticket Quota

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Sparta, Illinois, traffic ticket quota struck down as illegal by the state Supreme Court.

Illinois Supreme Court

Many states have laws prohibiting government officials from imposing traffic ticket quotas on police officers, but they are routinely ignored. Localities are often able to achieve the goal of increasing ticket-writing activity without having the formal "quota" label for the revenue generating demands placed on police officers. On Thursday, the Illinois Supreme Court refused to play word games and struck down an "activity point" system as illegal.

The city of Sparta had thought in 2013 it could use the activity point label to get around the ticket quota ban, which outlaws the practice of requiring an officer to issue "a specific number of citations within a designated period." Officers on the day shift were required to rack up 82 "points" and night-shift officers needed to score 65 points, with a traffic ticket counted as two points, but a warning written to a motorist earning a single point.

"Failure to reach the minimum monthly points will result in discipline," the Sparta police policy explained. "Discipline will be corrective and progressive in nature."

The local police union, the Policemen's Benevolent Labor Committee, decided to file suit to protect officers from this policy. A circuit court judge rejected the idea that the point system was merely a traffic ticket quota in disguise. Officers could, in theory, meet the points target without issuing any tickets at all, the city argued. The high court justices did not buy that argument.

"The policy, at least indirectly, may compare police officers based on the number of citations issued because points are awarded for citations and officers are compared and receive awards based on points of contact," the high court ruled. "By granting awards based on points of contact, the policy may provide an incentive for officers to write

citations to accumulate as many points as possible."

The court noted that the points system could still be used for other elements of the policeman's job -- just not the issuance of tickets.

"As we have found, the statute could not be clearer on the specific issue presented by this appeal, i.e., whether issuance of citations may be included as points of contact in the city's policy," the court concluded. "The statute simply cannot reasonably be read to permit municipalities to include the issuance of citations as points of contact."
