BIKERS INSIDE THE BELTWAY 2022 -- Paving the Way for the Long Haul

Bikers Inside the Beltway - Since 2009 the MRF has brought over a thousand motorcyclists to Washington to meet with their members of Congress to promote a legislative agenda that continues to successfully become law on behalf of all street riding motorcyclists.

Outside the MRF's legislative game

plan, top MRF legislative agenda items went unaddressed and fell short of reaching our goals as the 2021 infrastructure legislation moved forward. The MRF is in the fight for the long haul and is paving the way beyond 2021.

The MRF's legislative agenda – beyond the three items listed below -- was recommended and approved by SMRO leaders at the 2021 Meeting of the Minds, is not all-inclusive. The following items are at the top of the MRF's legislative agenda as we move toward Bikers Inside the Beltway:

Profiling: Sustain lobbying efforts for

the passage of resolutions or legislation that promotes awareness and prohibition of motorcyclists profiling.

Renewable Fuels: Advocate for targeted changes to the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS). Support the universal availability of approved fuel blends, containing no more than 10 percent ethanol by volume. Ensure that consumers are educated on proper fuel usage.

Autonomous Vehicles: Advocate and monitor any legislation or regulations related to motorcycles concerning connected and autonomous vehicles (AV) including endorsing rulemaking to set new standards specific to seeing, detecting, and properly reacting to motorcycles. Ensure motorcycles are part of all testing and development procedure.

The pandemic, and the events of January 6, 2021, did not deter the MRF. More than one hundred motorcyclists attended the first in-person meeting in 2021 with members of Congress last May. The above items are the missing pieces of the 2021 infrastructure legislation,



and they are driving the MRF's need to return to Washington when Bikers Inside the Beltway meets on May 17.

Ongoing security restrictions necessitate visitors to Congress establish appointments before arriving in D.C. The MRF will provide members with contact information to begin the process of setting your meetings with your congressional representatives.

Flexibility with appointments and expectations are essential. Some congressional offices will welcome in-person meetings within the Capitol Complex. Other offices may seek meetings outside the official government buildings. Still others may only conduct meetings over the phone or via Zoom.

Bikers inside the Beltway will be dual-faceted to accommodate in-person visits to Congress plus visits to local offices.

To ensure that the mission of getting our message to Congress does not fail, please consider the following:

Make your appointments locally or in Washington.

Familiarize yourself with the briefing points. Confirm your appointment locally or in Washington.

Virtual or in person, make notes on your meeting. Share your meeting notes with the MRF.

A meeting of the MRF Board of Directors will take place on May 16 at the Embassy Suites, 1900 Diagonal Road, Alexandria, Virginia. Rooms are available through the hotel direct line 703-684-5900 and use reference code MRF.

You do not want to miss the pre-event briefing and Q&A for visits to Congress, scheduled for 7:00 p.m., Monday, May 16. Briefing packets and "leave behinds" will be available during the briefing.

Making appointments with your members of Congress, attending the MRF board meeting, briefing session, and you are encouraged to make appointments with your members of Congress, and attending Bikers inside the Beltway are essential elements of grassroots activism at its best. Thank you for your commitment.

Please support Antiprofiling House Resolution 366 Call-to-Action to support Motorcycle Riders

Members of the House of Representatives left D.C. last week for two weeks of recess. While they are away their staff members are sorting through constituent mail and reviewing legislative priorities. Now is a great time to contact those congressional offices and have your voice heard!

H. Res 366 is a resolution focused on the profiling of bikers and it needs public support from all Members of Congress.

Click on the link below and you will be sent to a site that sends a letter to your Representative based on your zip code.

If your Representative has already signed on, your message will be a thank you note and ask them to push for a full vote on the House floor. If your elected official hasn't signed on, the message will ask for them to cosponsor H. Res 366 and go on record supporting bikers.

So far this year over 70 Representatives have cosponsored the resolution, but that is just half of where we were in 2020. Let's make sure the politicians in Washington, D.C. hear from bikers and act.

NHTSA Overview of Motor Vehicle Crashes in 2020

On Wednesday, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) released its Overview of Motor Vehicle Crashes in 2020. This report provides a snapshot of crashes, fatalities, and injuries sustained on our nation's roadways in 2020.

The statistics related to motorcyclists were troubling. In 2020, we saw an 11% increase in fatalities from the previous year. In 2019, 5,044 motorcyclists were killed on our roadways. In 2020 that number grew to 5,579. Thankfully, the number of injuries registered in the study dropped slightly from 83,814 in 2019 to 82,528 in 2020.

In total, 38,824 people died on U.S. roads in 2020. Motorcyclists made up 14% of that number. The loss of life is not contained to one area as motorcyclist fatalities in urban areas increased by 7.8 percent since 2019 and increased by 11 percent in rural areas.

What is perhaps most concerning is that total miles traveled by Americans dropped in 2020 by 11%, yet fatalities increased by 6.8%. Despite less miles being logged more people were killed. Obviously,

2020 was a unique year in which a global pandemic affected every facet of our lives. The data provided in this study can be useful but should be viewed with the understanding that 2020 was an unprecedented year.

Despite that, there is no question that reports like this will spur questions and ultimately action by policymakers in Washington, D.C. The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) is committed to ensuring motorcyclists have a voice when issues like safety are debated. Your support and commitment to giving the street rider a voice in our nation's capital remains vital.

Transportation Funding Unlocked

This week the House and Senate are tackling a selfimposed deadline to pass funding legislation before government departments and agencies run out of money. To avoid a government shutdown, a large omnibus spending bill is being voted on that will fund government operations through the end of September. Importantly for transportation related projects and programs, the omnibus bill unlocks billions of dollars in funding that Washington red tape has delayed.

Lawmakers and transportation officials have been warning for months that full implementation of the \$1.5 trillion infrastructure law, which was enacted in November, isn't possible because government funding is constrained at 2021 levels. So, while the money is actually in the accounts and ready to be spent, transportation agencies are locked out of using a large percentage of the money until this second piece of legislation is enacted.

Only in Washington, D.C. does it take two bills, five months apart, to achieve your policy objectives!

Lawmakers Focus on Tesla

Recently Tesla has come under criticism for its Autopilot and Full-Self Driving (FSD) features, which critics say give the impression to drivers that the vehicles are capable of hands-off operation. The U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has opened two investigations into Tesla's autopilot system and the automaker has launched nearly a dozen recalls in the U.S. Many of those recalls are related to over-the-air updates which allows Tesla to tweak and change its software remotely.

Last month, Senator Ed Markey (D-MA) and Richard Blumenthal (D-CT) sent a letter to Tesla seeking answers to a series of questions regarding its technology. Included in the letter were questions regarding safety programming, issues related to phantom braking and driver monitoring capabilities.

Tesla responded to the letter last week saying in part, "Tesla's Autopilot and FSD Capability features enhance the ability of our customers to drive safer than the average driver in the U.S.,"

Senators Blumenthal and Markey seemed less than impressed with Tesla's response to their questions. In a joint statement they said Tesla's response was "just more evasion and deflection from Tesla. Despite its troubling safety track record and deadly crashes, the company seemingly wants to carry on with business as usual."

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation has long been concerned that safety standards for self-driving and autonomous vehicle technology are inadequate. All motorcyclists should remember that these vehicles are on our roadways right now. Remain vigilant while riding, as the operators and perhaps even the manufacturers are not fully aware of what this technology can and cannot do.

NATIONAL AND REGIONAL NEWS

Pickerington, Ohio — In a collaborative effort to raise awareness of key issues and opportunities facing the motorcycle industry, riders, and motorcycle safety, the Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC), American Motorcyclist Association (AMA), and the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) joined forces to share industry priorities with United States Department of Transportation Secretary Buttigieg and department staff.

Following the recent passage of the bipar-

tisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), the MIC, AMA, and MSF voiced strong support for the investment in education, awareness, highway infrastructure, and the reauthorization of the Motorcyclist Advisory Council (MAC) to further inform the DOT, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) about ways to improve infrastructure to make roads safer for motorcyclists. They emphasized that actions required under the IIJA must

include motorcyclists.

The meeting also included a discussion around the need to ensure that both recognition and reaction to motorcycles are fully integrated into the developing crash avoidance and autonomous vehicle technologies in order to ensure safety for motorcyclists and drivers.

Industry leaders on the call noted that Secretary Buttigieg was very engaged in the discussion. He expressed a keen awareness and interest in ensuring that motorcyclists and the motorcycle safety community are part of safe roadway development. Additionally, he conveyed a clear understanding of the limitations and challenges autonomous vehicles present. The industry leaders expressed great appreciation for the Secretary's desire to include the motorcycle community in the implementation of infrastructure improvements and rollout of provisions in the highway reauthorization bill.

MOTORCYCLISTS HELP OUT **UKRAINE**

Motorcycle brands across the spectrum of biking are coming together to assist people affected by the Russian invasion of neighboring Ukraine, while multiple manufacturers have announced they will no longer sell bikes or supply parts to people in Russia, including Harley-Davidson, Suzuki and Honda, which is donating one million Euros to the Japanese Red Cross as humanitarian support for Ukrainians suffering through the enemy occupation.

Joining in on a growing list of economic sanctions, Yamaha, BMW, and Polaris have also halted exports to Russia in the wake of the ongoing crisis.

Ural publicly called for an end to the hostilities, while Timur Sardarov, the Russian CEO of MV Agusta, described the "horrific atrocities... conducted by the Russian regime" as the "biggest tragedy in his 40 years of existence" in an open letter. Both incredibly brave moves by Russian owned businesses.

There have also been moves from motorcycling groups from around the world to condemn Russia's militaristic actions. Europe's FIM (The Fédération Internationale de Motocyclisme) has suspended all Russian and Belrusian riders' licenses, with the British ACU (Auto Cycle Union) joining them in applying the same suspension for the UK. The FIM have also cancelled three MXGP rounds of racing that were due to take place in Russia.

E.U. BANS MOTORCYCLE **EXPORTS TO RUSSIA**

The European Union officially enacted additional trade restrictions on exports to Russia, in light of the latter nation's February 2022 invasion of Ukraine, including a ban on the export of European motorcycles and/or parts with values over 5,000 Euros. The measure comes as part of a list of additional prohibitions and restrictions on Russia as it continues this assault.

The motorcycle pronouncement, along with other decisions, were published in the Official Journal of the European Union on March 15, 2022 and, in accordance with the E.U.'s rules of governance, these rules immediately went into effect as of that publication date.

The new rules address energy sector concerns, importation of iron and steel products, and matters concerning European luxury goods and their export to Russia. "Motorcycles" specifically come up on the "luxury goods" list,

which also includes horses, wines, cigars, perfumes, clothing, jewelry, precious metals and stones, electronics, and yachts.

U.S. TRAFFIC FATALITIES / FATALI-TY RATE HIGHEST IN A DECADE On March 2, 2022, the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration released its 2020 Annual Traffic Crash Data, revealing the highest number of lives lost on U.S. roadways since 2007, despite fewer miles traveled.

While the number of crashes and traffic injuries declined overall, fatal crashes increased by 6.8%, with 38,824 fatalities nationwide. The fatality rate per 100 million vehicle miles traveled increased to 1.34, a 21% increase from 2019 and again the highest rate since 2007.

In some good news, the estimated number of police-reported crashes in 2020 decreased by 22% as compared to 2019, and the estimated number of people injured declined by 17%.

In 45% of fatal crashes, the drivers of passenger vehicles were engaged in at least one of the following risky behaviors: speeding (up 17%), alcohol impairment (up 14%), or not wearing a seat belt (up 14%).

Fatalities amongst all vulnerable road

users was up across the board; Motorcyclist fatalities up 11% (highest number since first data collection in 1975), Bicyclist fatalities up 9.2% (highest number since 1987), and Pedestrian fatalities up 3.9% (highest number since 1989).

Obviously 2020 was a uniquely anomalous year, with a global pandemic affecting every facet of everyday life, but it's troubling to see such increased carnage even with less travel.

Total vehicle miles traveled (VMT) decreased by 11% in 2020, from 3,261,772 million to 2,903,622 million.

ARIZONA LEGISLATURE APPROVES LANE FILTERING Lane Splitting and Lane Filtering bills are popping up more frequently, and if Senate Bill 1273 is signed into law by Arizona's Governor Doug Ducey (R), it would be a welcome relief for riders stuck in Phoenix traffic on a 110-degree

While "Lane Splitting" allows motorcyclists to ride between moving lanes of traffic, like California has allowed for many years, the term "Lane Filtering" allows riders to move between stopped traffic such as riding to the front of traf-

fic at a stop light.

Arizona's neighbor, Utah, made headlines in 2019 when it adopted lane filtering, and Montana legalized filtering in March of last year. Oregon came close to legalizing filtering last year, but the bill was stopped by the governor's veto.

The allowed filtering described in Arizona SB 1273 is similar to Utah's, with riders able to filter to the front on multi-lane roads, between two lanes going in the same direction, where the speed limit is 45 mph or less and surrounding traffic is stopped, and riding no faster than 15 mph.

Arizona's bill, passed by the state legislature and awaiting their governor's approval, is the latest in a trend towards Utah-style lane filtering over Californiastyle lane splitting. This popular compromise allows motorcyclists to move through the worst parts of traffic, but in a milder method than the lane splitting practiced in many other parts of the

NEW HAMPSHIRE LEGISLATOR CLAIMS BEING PROFILED FOR RIDING A MOTORCYCLE

While testifying in support of House Bill 1000, which would prohibit profiling of motorcycle riders by law enforcement, House Speaker Sherman Packard suggested he was profiled during a traffic stop several years ago in New Hampshire.

Packard (R-Londonderry), who is the highest-ranking member of the Republican majority, testified in the Public Hearing that he was stopped on Route 1A in Rye, N.H. about nine years ago. "I was in a pack of motorcycles and was the only one stopped by an officer," he testified.

Packard said he was told by the officer he had passed a car on a double yellow line. He said he denied it, and the officer then told Packard he was riding on the double yellow line, which he again denied doing. He said he was detained for about 20 minutes, indicating he felt it was a case of profiling because he was a motorcycle rider. He also said he did not know why the other motorcycle riders he was with were not stopped.

Sherm Packard, a longtime motorcycle rider and champion of bikers' rights, was a founding member of the NCOM Legislative Task Force and developed the National Coalition of Motorcyclists' informational brochure "A Biker's Guide to Getting Elected to Public Office".

Packard is also a cosponsor of HB 1000, which was voted out of the House on March 11 with an "Ought to Pass" recommendation.

MOTORCYCLES ARE GOOD FOR YOUR BRAIN AND BODY

A new study shows that motorcyclists are less stressed and more fulfilled than

The scientific study originally set about trying to find out if bikers were constantly riding in fear of being involved in an accident, but inadvertently proved the opposite! The results center around a certain hormone called Cortisol that is released in the brain when we become anxious, finding that bikers produce 28% less Cortisol during testing than drivers on the same course.

The study was conducted by The Institute of Neuroscience and Human Behaviour (INHB) in a controlled manner, with 50 motorcyclists and 50 car drivers making their way around a closed course for 20-minutes. During this time, the team measured the user's heart rate, Cortisol, and adrenaline levels, and monitored brain activity.

Results indicated that when riding, the subjects experienced increased sensory focus and resilience to distraction. Riding also produced an increase in adrenaline levels and heart rate, and a decrease in Cortisol levels -- the kind of results you often get after a light exercise session, which also is a stress reducer.

The news regarding the mental wellbeing of motorcyclists goes hand in hand with a study that found that riding a motorcycle can burn anywhere between 170-600 calories an hour -- as much as an hour at the gym -- making motorcycles good for your mind and body!

SMART MOTORWAY FAILS Within days after the Stopped Vehicle Detection system (SVD) failed to prevent a fatal crash on England's M25 smart motorway, a series of internal emails from Highways England paint a horrifying picture, with sections of the road described as effectively blind to stopped vehicles.

The problem stems from the SVD system that should detect a stopped vehicle in a live lane, alerting the control room to close the lane with red 'X'.

The Daily Mail reports that transportation staff are plagued with similar outages on the smart motorway network, with staff seeing errors and outages so much, they don't actually have the time to report the error. Indeed, at the time of the M25 outage, a bug prevented an alert from being broadcast to the staff, meaning they had no warning of an incident they could react to.

As the catalogue of failings grows and the death toll mounts, the cry for smart motorways to be scrapped altogether grows louder and louder. And it isn't just the public that is outraged, as politicians on all sides have called for the 'fatal' scheme to be axed, once and for

Tabling: Tips and Tricks for Creating ABATE Visibility

Tabling is a great way to increase visibility for ABATE and spread the word about ABATE's work. But there's more to it than sitting at a table with brochures. Read the guide below to learn how to plan a tabling event that recruits new members and engages your community on ABATE issues. If you're not already in touch with ABATE's Legislative staff, e-mail us at lobbyist@abateofaz.org for assistance.

What Is Tabling?

Tabling can help you raise awareness and garner support for an issue, advertise for events, and recruit new members. Set up a table with information and sign-up forms and then engage with passersby to recruit them as members, inform them about ABATE policy issues, and ask them to take action. EVERY chapter should be tabling at bike nights, open house events, etc.

Before the Event

Choose a location

Set up your table in a high-traffic area with good visibility. If people can't see your table from far away, they will be less likely to stop by. For chapters, this might be at a conference, farmers market, community center, college, or university.

ABATE does a lot of good work, but it can be overwhelming if it's all displayed

on one table. Instead, choose a specific issue or program to focus on (such as the MAP Program or how we fight against bad legislation) during your tabling event. Choose an issue that will be relevant to the specific audience. For example, if you are tabling on a college campus in the fall before an election, you may want to have ABATE's get-out-the-vote information available.

Plan an ask or two

Tabling should do more than just inform people about an issue. You also want them to take action! Once you select an issue or program to focus on, choose a specific way you'll ask them to get involved. Ask them to attend an upcoming event, join our Call to Action Network, or sign up for a ride. If your tabling location has internet access and electrical outlets available, you may be able to set up a laptop for people to take action immediately at the table.

Recruit and train volunteers

Tabling is an easy way for new and seasoned members alike to contribute to the work of ABATE. Encourage all your members to be a part of your tabling activities, and build their skills and confidence by providing training ahead of time. Fill them in on your focus, asks, and the tabling best practices shared in this resource. Then have them role-play engaging passersby and give them feedback.

Advertise your event

Put up flyers, post on social media, and

send e-mails announcing when and where you will be tabling. The more people know about your table in advance, the more people will stop by.

Gather materials

Print copies of your event calendar, have membership sign-up forms. You can order a 3-by-5-foot ABATE banner, sign, pop up canopy or tablecloth from one of our ABATE business members who does printing if you don't already have one. Make sure you have the advocacy materials and membership and program brochures and postcards you need.

Consider tabling with a video

Video is a fantastic tool to help you engage with future ABATE members and show the world what ABATE does on behalf of motorcyclists. Use a laptop to play the video continuously when you table; it will attract attention and add a visual element to your ask. To avoid having to rely on Wi-Fi or internet access, email Mike at lobbyist@abateofaz.org for an appropriate video file. Before the event, find the closest power outlet, figure out whether you will need an extension cord, and practice running the video.

During the Event

Approach passersby

Make sure to have at least one ABATE member standing in front of the table who can approach people as they walk by instead of waiting for people to come to them. It helps to develop a good "stopper" line — something you can say to

grab their attention and draw them toward the table. For example, lines such as "Are you worth \$1 per year?" or "Sign here to support lane filtering!" may intrigue passersby enough that they stop to learn more about your work.

Make your ask

Ask them to get involved **AND** wait for a definitive answer. Also make sure to get their contact information so that you can keep them informed about ABATE's work.

Have a giveaway

People are enticed by freebies and are more likely to stop by your table if they get something for doing so.

Have ABATE-branded giveaways such as pens, highlighters, or even bandanas!


ABATE also has plenty of stickers on Motorcycle Safety and Awareness, which you can request on our event form that will be available on the state website soon.

After the Event

Follow up

Get in touch with the people who took action at your table. E-mail will work, although a phone call can be more personal. The follow-up conversation is an opportunity to confirm their attendance at your upcoming event or make another ask, such as coming to a future chapter meeting. After your event, don't forget to let us know how it went.

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

On September 23, 2020, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed an executive order banning the sale of most internal combustion engines (ICE) by 2035. The California ICE ban will impact 16 other states who previously signed on to adopt California's regulations under Section 177 of the Clean Air Act. Today non-profit organizations from 15 of those states launched a new coalition to oppose these California style regulations and ICE bans in their states. The coalition authored an open letter which may be found by clicking here. The letter is being shared in the various states with elected officials, the media, activists, members, small businesses, and civic minded people. In Massachusetts, the letter is being mailed to the Governor, Lt. Governor and all the members of the Massachusetts leg-

The new coalition of non-profit organizations represent citizens and businesses in all states that will be impacted by California Governor Gavin Newsom's executive order to phase out and eventually ban the sale of new internal combustion engine vehicles by 2035. Under the order, only Zero Emission Vehicles (ZEV) may be sold by 2035. California is

the only state in the country that may promulgate their own vehicle emission regulations, but 16 other states have adopted the California Air Resources Board (CARB) program. The 16 states are New York (implementation 1993), Massachusetts (1995), Vermont (2000), Maine (2001), Pennsylvania (2001), Connecticut (2008), Rhode Island (2008) Washington (2009), Oregon (2009), New Jersey (2009), Maryland (2011), Delaware (2014), Colorado (2022), Minnesota (2025), Nevada (2025) and Virginia (2025).

All impacted states should be troubled by the nature of Governor Newsom's executive order. Lawmakers from these 16 states would be stripped of the right and responsibility to represent their constituents. Consumers would be deprived of options. Significant discrepancies exist between extreme emission reduction plans and the realities they would produce in the other states. Many of the states that originally joined California, did so with the understanding that they would be following best practices for efficiencies, not blanket bans of vital products.

"These extreme California regulations would ban the sale of these products in all of the New England states, except New Hampshire. New Hampshire would become the beneficiary of this ill-considered proposal, as residents and businesses would flock to their state for its lower costs and larger array of options. Unlike the major population centers of California, the vast majority of the states that this ban would affect deal with harsh winter months that produce heavy snow falls. California Governor Newsom's order will eliminate the option of reliable vehicles that perform well in our weather conditions. If this sneaks through, it would be a cruel trick to play on the residents of Massachusetts," stated Chip Ford, executive director for Citizens for Limited Taxation.

"Now is the worst possible time for State House leaders to shrug their shoulders and allow the Governor of California to ban the sale of some popular vehicles in Massachusetts. If the current events have taught us anything, it's that more options for consumers are necessary. ZEV batteries rely on components that are controlled by foreign countries, that should concern

everyone right now. What Massachusetts needs is more options, not less. Even if the mood at the State House is to ban popular vehicles, that is a policy decision that should be debated and voted on by our lawmakers and the Governor," concluded Paul Diego Craney, spokesperson for Massachusetts Fiscal Alliance.

NEW IN THE NATIONAL MOTORCY-CLE MUSEUM--The Dream 50R was designed and built to commemorate Honda's early road racing history, some of which was in the 50cc class. The 50R followed the 1997 release of the street legal red-framed Dream 50, aka AC15.

Honda began making motorcycle engines in 1947, soon after World War II ended. Production machines of the 1960's were very technically sophisticated compared to British and American offerings of the time. Soichiro Honda believed that racing improved his company's engineering, and by 1959 Honda was making factory racers and beginning to win Grand Prix championships.

Though the race winning RC factory race bikes could not be bought by privateers, the CR, "customer racer" line-up was available and was much lighter and higher tech than the also race-able 125cc CB92s or 250cc Hawks of the time. The 50cc CR110, 125cc CR93 and 250cc CR72 were prized in their time and highly collectible today. The Dream 50R commemorates the CR110.

Though not as exotic as the early 1960's CR110 with an 8-speed transmission it emulates, this 2005 Dream 50R is styled in the same vein, pays homage to the days of sleek, long alloy fuel tanks, alloy fenders, solo "bump pad" seats and air-cooled DOHC four-stroke engines. The Dream 50R, and it's legal-in-some-countries Dream 50 cousin, have a strong "tuner"

following in Japan, and a wide range of cosmetic and performance parts are available. Honda HRC, responsible for the 50R and decades of Honda factory race bikes, also offers parts for these machines which were made for about a year in a small batch.

CLIMATE DEPOT ALERT-- The Pause Lengthens Again: No Global Warming Since 2014 – 7 Years 5 Months

No warming since October 2014:



Note that all these charts are anomaly charts. They make the warming look much greater and more drastic than it is in reality. The 0.58 K warming trend since late 1978 represents an increase of just 0.2% in absolute global mean surface temperature – hardly a crisis, still less an emergency.







Harley-Davidson Museum campus roars all March long (continued)

His rehabilitation was difficult as he endured numerous surgeries. During this same time, the Harley-Davidson Museum regularly sent care packages - including H-D MuseumTM flags dotted with well wishes - to active-duty military personnel. Breckheimer took to mountaineering during his recovery and over the summer carried the H-D MuseumTM flag to the summit of Denali, the highest point in North America. With that peak reached, Breckheimer became the first and only Purple Heart recipient to reach all the Seven Summits, the highest peaks on each of the seven continents. He continues to climb, and he shares his inspiring story to encourage resiliency and support the mental health of veterans and current service members.

Revolution® Max Engine (on display now)

The brand-new Revolution® Max 1250cc engine powers a new generation of Harley-Davidson® motorcycles. See the liquid-cooled, 60-degree V-Twin that delivers for the Pan AmericaTM adventure touring model and the performance cruiser Sportster® S motorcycle. On view in the Museum lobby.

Clubs & Competition (on display now) In the early part of the 20th century, motorcycle culture was a homegrown phenomenon. It grew out of the passion of riders for their evolving sport. The camaraderie that developed around riding and attending competitive events led to the formation of motorcycle clubs that hosted destination rides, family picnics with motorcycle games and other riding competitions.

The newly reinstalled display case in the Clubs & Competition gallery highlights clothing from club members from primarily the 1930s and 1940s. The clothing selections on view include full dress uni-

forms, shirts, sweaters, jackets and caps, customized by the owners with their club's name and logo, and pins or patches indicating membership in the American Motorcyclist Association. The H-D Archives collection includes Motorclothes® apparel sold in H-D® product catalogs but also non-H-D produced clothing items that have been proudly customized by riders.

Harley Fox (on display now)
Gail Anderson's 1986 Softail® Custom motorcycle, "Harley Fox," built by her partner Bob Burrows, took top prize at the first Ladies of Harley® (LOH) ride-in show during Daytona Beach Bike Week in 1987. With her custom bike and themed riding gear, Anderson presented a striking image that fit the growing visibility and exciting new options for women riders in the 1980s.

Alfonso Sotomayor's 1957 Model FL (on display now)

The Harley-Davidson Museum is proud to announce its collection has recently grown with the addition of a 1957 Model FL that was ridden by famed Mexican stunt rider and racer Alfonso Sotomayor Canales.

Harley-Davidson's history in Mexico dates back to at least 1913. In the 1920s, the brand was more frequently spotted throughout Mexico City as the motorcycles proved popular with the local traffic police who would also perform stunts with their Harley-Davidson® bikes. After racing from the 1930s into the 1960s, Sotomayor launched his own stunt riding career by performing the famed "Salto de la Muerte" or Jump of Death. Learn more about Sotomayor's feats of derring-do and Harley-Davidson's early entry into Mexico with this new display located in the Custom Culture area.

"Off-Road Harley-Davidson" (on display

In the decades before America paved its highways, early riders had to be prepared for all sorts of terrain: sand, clay or dirt – and wandering those makeshift byways were Harley-Davidson® motorcycles. Today, it's called off-road or adventure touring; back then it was just called riding. Since 1903, Harley-Davidson motorcycles proved their toughness by riding over wooded hills, through stone-choked creek beds and up mountain sides. "Off-Road Harley-Davidson" tells the history of motorcycles designed for rough roads, the people who rode them and the adventures they shared.

"Building a Milwaukee Icon: Harley-Davidson's Juneau Avenue Factory" (on display now)

A recently recovered cache of architectural drawings includes plans for the original Juneau Avenue facility. The pencil drawings, along with archival photographs, demonstrate the whirlwind pace of the company's early growth. While building an international business—going from producing just over 1,000 motorcycles in 1909 to manufacturing 27,000 motorcycles in 1920—the company's Milwaukee factory experienced near-constant expansion. Construction through this relatively brief period created the buildings that today, a century later, are still the proud home of Harley-Davidson.

"Building a Milwaukee Icon" provides a snapshot of Harley-Davidson's formative years and illustrates a chapter of Milwaukee history when the city was known as the "Machine Shop to the World."





Attacks on speed cameras took place last week in New York, Australia, France, Italy, Kenya and the UK.

Smashed Italian speed camera

In Queensland, Australia, a 40-year-old riding an e-scooter rammed a police officer who was using a handheld speed camera on Dorsal Drive on Tuesday. The scooter rider was attempting to avoid the senior constable who was knocked to the

ground while attempting to catch the rider who was accused by the device of traveling at 45km/h (28 MPH). The officer suffered minor road rash on his elbow and the man was later identified and charged with assault, according to the Queensland Police Service. A similar incident took place one day earlier in Mombasa, Kenya. Officer Phiona Mutua Ndanu was running a speed trap on Sheikh Abdalla Farsy Road when tried to stop a moving car and was struck and injured. She was taken to a local hospital for treatment.

A bicycle-riding vigilante blasted the red light camera at the intersection of

Atlantic Avenue and Woodhaven Boulevard in Queens, New York, on Tuesday. The man used a pair of handguns to fire sixteen shots at the automated ticketing machine before riding away.


On Sunday, vigilantes in La Roche-Jaudy, France, torched the speed camera on the RD6. The device had only been installed a week ago. On the previous day, vigilantes in Joue-les-Tours blinded the speed camera on the RD37 with red spraypaint. On Friday, spraypaint was used to disable five speed cameras in the Deux-Sevres department. At the beginning of last week, the speed camera on

the CD945 in Mazerolles was disabled with black paint.

In Monte di Malo, Italy, a speed camera failed to prevent a collision on the Via Boro. After being struck by a silver sedan, a red work van crashed directly into the orange "Velo OK" speed camera. In Somerset, England, motorist Ed Evans thwarted the speed camera van on the A38 by parking in front of it and blocking the camera's view of the road.


