

"Speaking freely" since its first orchestrated visit with members of Congress in 1989, is exactly what the Motorcycle Riders Foundation does. And the results are evident in the MRF's history of legislative accomplishments.

Participatory democracy is what the MRF is all about. Bikers Inside the Beltway is a 13year exercise in participatory democracy.

Biker's Inside the Beltway is about making a difference. You still have time to make a difference and let your voice be heard when you attend Bikers Inside the Beltway on May 17!

Protecting the rights of motorcyclists is not just a collection of words in a press release any more than leaving your motorcycle parked in your garage is about riding.

Profiling, E-15 (ethanol fuel), autonomous vehicles, all part of the present and future of motorcycling. The MRF's legislative agenda is a result of input from motorcyclists with the directions to take care of business on Capitol Hill. That's what Bikers Inside the Beltway is all about.

The MRF understands motorcycling, motor-

cyclists' rights, and what it takes to keep the siege against your rights, your freedom, your lifestyle, and yes, your motorcycle at bay. However, participatory democracy works best with participants. Your participation in Bikers Inside the Beltway is needed now.

Your visit to Congress does make a difference. In 2021, co-sponsors on MRF supported legislation rose over 20 percent during Bikers Inside the Beltway. Numbers make a difference. Currently, there are almost ninety co-sponsors on H. Res 366 - an anti-profiling resolution. 

President's Report



Greetings to all my fellow Freedom Fighters, supporters of motorcycle rights and ABATE members!

As I sit down to write this monthly report I look back through my notes and see everything that happened this past month. Our Legislative Director Mike Infanzon has been working hard on all the legislation that has anything to do with motorcyclists. He is also working on how to educate the public on the new Lane Filtering law before it goes into effect, which will not happen until 90 days after the state legislature finishes their business for the year. This may take some time because they have to still pass a new budget and this being an election year the parties are not working nicely together.

Most years Mike Infanzon would be traveling to Washington D.C. to attend the Annual Michael "Boz" Kerr Biker's Inside the Beltway. This annual event is put on by our friends at the Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF).

This event is a way for motorcycle rights activists to gather and lobby the members of Congress. Unfortunately due to the state of the economy the cost of airfare and hotel rooms has jumped significantly and has outpaced our budget. We will continue to contact all the members of Congress that represent Arizona by telephone, email and also contacting their local offices here in Arizona.

This past month of May was also Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month. I know many of our cities and towns have issued proclamations designating May as Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month as well as the State. I hope that all of our chapters have partaken in various events to promote motorcycle safety around our state. Thank you to everyone for all you do to make Arizona safe for ALL motorcyclists.

In April I had the great experience of attending an Accident Scene Management Class presented by Teresa and Ben Martinez. It was held at Tucson Harley-Davidson and sponsored by The Husband & Wife Law Team. The Breyer Law Team provided a 25% discount for those who attend as well as providing lunch. I wish to thank them and especially Ms. Rosi Khazoom for all they do to help make motorcyclists in Arizona safe. If you ever have a chance to attend one of these amazing classes I highly recommend that you do it. You will learn much and meet other motorcyclists, and the knowledge you acquire may one day save a life.

I made the ride up to Phoenix the last weekend in April to attend the Arizona Confederation of Motorcycle Clubs (ACMC) monthly meeting. For those who may not know ABATE of Arizona is a Charter member of the ACMC. The ACMC meets monthly and allows MCs from around the state to get together and discuss various topics that affect the motorcycling community and the motorcycle clubs in particular. ABATE works with the ACMC on legislative issues and other issues that come to light. The meetings are moved to different locations throughout the state every month to allow more clubs to attend.

I had the pleasure of attending the annual fundraiser for the Arizona Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Foundation which is called "Riding for the Long Haul". It was held May 7th at the El Zaribah Shiner's auditorium in Phoenix. ABATE of Arizona was a sponsor and purchased a table for 8 in support of AMSAF and their mission to make the streets and roads of Arizona safer for all of us.

June brings some of the best riding weather of the year especially in the high country of our great state of Arizona. It also brings the heat and the threat of dehydration. Please remember that if you wait until you are thirsty it is too late. Drink plenty of water, before during and after your rides, use sun screen and cover the exposed skin on hot sunny days. Also remember that alcohol will dehydrate you faster, watch your consumption especially when riding in hot weather.

June is also the month when my favorite event of the year happens. TOO BROKE FOR STURGIS! This year is the 31st year that ABATE of Arizona is hosting this event. The committee has been hard at work and they have a great event lined up for us. I know that many of you look forward to this event every year and really enjoy all the games, music, vendors, food, camaraderie, and the great riding in the area. Too Broke is much more than that. This is the only major fund raising event that ABATE of Arizona puts on at the State level. ALL proceeds from this wonderful weekend go towards continuing the fight for "Freedom of the Road". This event helps pay for the publication of the Masterlink, it helps fund delegations to participate in conferences with other motorcycle rights activists from around the country. TBFS also allows ABATE of Arizona to support the efforts of the American Motorcyclists Association (AMA) and the Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) on a national level, and much more than I can list here. So when you attend TBFS not only are you having a GREAT weekend, you are helping to make sure that ALL motorcyclists will continue to enjoy the freedoms that we are so blessed to be enjoying now. I encourage all who believe in the Freedom of the Road to join ABATE of Arizona if you have not done so. Even if you cannot attend your local meetings it is important that we expand our membership. The politicians who try to limit our freedoms see the strength in our numbers and feel the pressure when we send out a call to action and their email boxes are flooded and the phone lines are screaming. It is by showing as a united front that we will be heard.

As you ride up to beautiful Mormon Lake Lodge and Campground, please be watchful for the wildlife up in the Coconino Forest. There are Elk and Deer throughout the area and many other creatures especially near dawn and dusk. Enjoy the trip but ride safe.

As always ABATE and the Too Broke committee are in need of volunteers to help with this event. The committee is providing free admission to those who sign up to work two (2) four hour shifts. This is a great way to support our organization and to meet others from around the state who are also volunteering. Please consider stepping up and volunteering at Too Broke for Sturgis!

I look forward to seeing many of our members up at Mormon Lake Lodge and Campground. Remember that the reason more of your fellow motorcyclists are not members of ABATE of Arizona is because they have never been asked to join! If every ABATE member recruited just one new member every year our numbers would double every year and we would be a force to be reckoned with. You will also read from time-to-time articles espousing the work of the MRF in Washington D.C. and around the country. Most of you have not attained a membership in the MRF and maybe not even ABATE of AZ. Nevertheless, the work for the motorcyclists of ARIZONA and the country goes on.

Blackjacks Roadhouse put on its fourth Ride For Mom fundraiser May 14 to raise awareness and funds for victims of domestic violence.

Funds were raised for the Leduc and District Victim Services, a charity working with Leduc, Beaumont, Devon, Thorsby, Breton and the Edmonton International Airport RCMP detachments to provide everyday assistance (the exact total was not known at press time).

The event has been held annually since

U.S. PRESIDENT RECOGNIZES MOTORCYCLE SAFETY AWARENESS MONTH

As the month of May kickstarts the riding season around the country, and Motorcycle Awareness Month reminds drivers to watch out for us riders, so comes a welcome acknowledgement of our safety concerns by none other than the President of the United States, who himself has been spotted aboard a Suzuki Hayabusa and a Harley or two.

"My Administration remains committed to ensuring the safety of everyone who rides a motorcycle and all who travel across our Nation," President Joe Biden wrote in a letter dated May 1, 2022.

The acknowledgment comes on the heels of the new Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, intended to benefit and modernize America's highways, roads, and bridges. "All of us who travel America's roads have an important role in securing a safe motorcycle-riding environment," added Biden.

"The Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) has worked closely with the

Department of Transportation (DoT) and the Biden administration to bring issues facing motorcyclists to the fore-front," commented Scott Schloegel, senior vice president of government relations for MSF.

"This administration has placed a priority on reducing highway deaths and on educating the motoring public," Schloegel continued, "and we appreciate that this presidential recognition is one of many ways they are working to accomplish that goal."

TRAFFIC DEATHS TOP 16 YEAR HIGH

Traffic fatality figures for 2021 were the highest in 16 years, with nearly 43,000 people killed last year as Americans returned to the roadways following the coronavirus lockdowns and travel restrictions.

A 10.5% jump over 2020 numbers was the largest percentage increase since the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) began its fatality data collection system in 1975.

"Exacerbating the problem was a persistence of risky driving behaviors during the pandemic, such as speeding and less frequent use of seat belts, as people began to venture out more in 2021 for out-of-state and other road

trips," analysts told the Associated Press (AP) in a May 18th report.

U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg said America faces a crisis on its roads, and urged state and local governments, drivers and safety advocates to join in an effort to reverse the trend.

Preliminary figures recently released by the agency show that 42,915 people died in traffic crashes last year, up from 38,824 in 2020. Final figures will be released in the fall.

Forty-four states as well as the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico had increases in traffic deaths in 2021 compared with the previous year, led by Texas, California and Florida. Posting declines were Wyoming, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Maryland and Maine.

Americans drove about 325 billion more miles last year, 11.2% higher than in 2020, which contributed to the increase.

TEENAGERS MORE LIKELY TO DIE IN A CAR CRASH THAN BY COVID

Teen driving is nearly four-times deadlier than CoViD-19, and the "100 deadliest days" of summer are most dangerous of all with a 21% spike in

teen traffic deaths between Memorial Day and Labor Day weekend when kids are out of school, on the roads more, and we have more daylight hours.

Those contributing factors mean an estimated 1100 to 1600 young people will die on our roads, as compared to estimates that fewer than 400 could lose their life to coronavirus.

That's why the National Road Safety Foundation has created a virtual campaign designed to remind young people on social media that when you're behind the wheel, distractions by your friends, your phone, or your radio could get you killed.

Tips focus on driving safely and being responsible, and talk about everything from speeding to distractions to how to select a driving school.

You can find out more by looking up teen driving tips at The Safest Summer Ever.

SADD, which stands for Students Against Destructive Decisions has also teamed up for the program that runs through Labor Day.

EUROPEAN MOTORCYCLISTS FIGHT TO PROTECT RIDER DATA Envisioning a world where your motorcycle tracks, records, and reports your departure and arrival time, speed, and GPS location, the Federation of European Motorcyclists Associations (FEMA) is taking proactive steps to address the potential issues at stake.

Far from fantasy, automotive manufacturers and legislators are actively considering privacy bills to protect vehicle owners' data from misuse, as autonomous, vehicle-to-vehicle (V2V), and vehicle-to-everything (V2X) advancing technologies allow manufacturers and consumers to turn over more of the driving responsibilities to computers.

To combat misuse, several states in the U.S., including California, Virginia, and Colorado, have introduced bills regulating the collection and use of such data, but FEMA wants to get ahead of the curve internationally when it comes to motorcycles.

On one hand, autonomous motorcycles may be a long way off, but V2V and V2X tech would certainly improve a motorcyclist's visibility to fellow motorists, greatly enhancing safety, but while such future technologies present clear benefits, the privacy issues may be a deal-breaker for some riders. In a prepared statement, FEMA explained that, "The owner of the motorcycle must be in control of the data and be able to decide who gets access to it."

For those familiar with computers or smart devices, this type of permissions-based check is the norm. Whether collecting browser cookies or accessing your phone's photo gallery, firms must ask for the user's approval before gathering data. FEMA recently sent a letter to the European Commission (EC) expressing that the same standard should apply to your vehicle's data.

NEW HAMPSHIRE OUTLAWS MOTORCYCLE PROFILING It is now illegal in New Hampshire for law enforcement to pull over, search or arrest anyone simply because that person "rides a motorcycle or wears motorcycle-related paraphernalia."

Governor Chris Sununu signed House Bill 1000 into law on Friday, May 20, 2022, making New Hampshire the fifth state to prohibit the discriminatory practice behind Washington (2011), Maryland (2016), Louisiana (2019) and Idaho (2020).

Co-sponsored by longtime bikers' rights leader Sherman Packard, House Speaker representing Londonderry, the bill prohibits law enforcement agencies from engaging in motorcycle profiling, and states: "No state, county, or municipal law enforcement agency shall engage in motorcycle profiling. In this section, 'motorcycle profiling' shall mean use of the fact that a person rides a motorcycle or wears motorcycle-related paraphernalia as a basis for deciding to stop and question, take enforcement action, arrest, or search a person or vehicle under the United States Constitution or the New Hampshire constitution.

Packard, an original member of the National Coalition of Motorcyclists (NCOM) Legislative Task Force, testified before the House Transportation Committee that a previous encounter with a local police officer convinced him New Hampshire still has a "small problem" with some profiling of motorcyclists; "This is a problem, not as major in New Hampshire as it is in some other states, but I have personally been a victim of it."

According to the text of HB 1000, "This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage."

SEEKING SUPPORT FOR FEDER-AL ANTI-PROFILING MEASURE Congressman Tim Walberg (R-MI) has sent a "Dear Colleague Letter" to all members of the U.S. House of Representatives on May 4, 2022 asking his fellow Representatives to cosponsor H. Res 366 to prevent the discriminatory profiling of motorcycle riders by law enforcement.

As the co-chair of the House Motorcycle Caucus, Rep. Walberg wrote to each of the 434 House members on behalf of America's 10 million motorcyclists during Motorcycle Awareness Month; "Motorcycles and motorcyclists not only represent an important part of our transportation network but are also an iconic part of the fabric of Americana. Over the years numerous motorcyclists have reached out to my office and others to discuss their concerns over the profiling of motorcyclists."

He goes on to say that, "In response to these concerns, myself, Congressman Burgess (TX), Congresswoman Bustos (IL) and Congressman Pocan (WI) introduced H. Res. 366 a resolution that promotes awareness of motorcyclist profiling and encourages collaboration between the motorcycle community and law enforcement officials to prevent instances of profiling."

As of his writing, 90 bipartisan members of the House had cosponsored the resolution including at least one member from 34 different states. In December of 2018, the U.S. Senate passed a nearly identical resolution on this topic. "I am hopeful we in the House can do the same."

Please contact your state's congressional delegation by calling the Capitol switchboard at (202) 224-3121 and ask them to join Rep. Walberg in cosponsoring H. Res. 366 "and support the thousands of bikers back home in your district."

CALIFORNIA MAY ESTABLISH PILOT NOISE CAMERA PRO-GRAM

In mid-May, 2022, the California state legislature passed a bill that would create a pilot "noise camera" program to target excessively loud motorcycles and cars. The bill now goes to Governor Gavin Newsom for his signature -- and if he signs it into law, the pilot program will officially go into effect on January 1, 2023 and run through December 31, 2027, after which point it will be repealed.

Under the language of SB-1079 as

passed, a total of six yet-to-be-determined cities across California would implement a pilot program, using automated, so-called 'noise cameras' to "capture vehicle noise levels that exceed the legal sound limit."

Complicating matters, the legal sound limits for cars and motorcycles in California have been in place for years, and are inexplicably different, with a limit of 95 decibels for cars and 80 for motorcycles built after 1985.

Noise cameras have been used in Europe and came to the United States last fall when New York began piloting their use. Earlier this year, Knoxville, Tenn., also began testing a noise camera, and Newark, NJ is currently exploring their use.

the Cycle Source Man of the Year (2006).

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














Motor City should be Renamed Speed Hump City

The city of Detroit recently identified more than 2,000 new speed hump locations. The plan is to install 3,000 of the traffic obstacles by the end of 2022.

That is in addition to the 5,500 humps added throughout the city in 2021. When this street obstacle program started as part of Detroit's Complete Streets program, the city only had 400 in place. If plans meet expectations, Detroit will have more than 10,500 speed humps to disrupt traffic before 2023.

Should Detroit's nickname be changed to reflect the new reality?

Speed humps are different than speed

bumps and cushions. They are generally 12 to 14 feet long, spanning the width of the road and ranging from three to four inches high. The shapes can be parabolic, circular, or sinusoidal. Speed humps are typically placed on residential streets, mid-block between intersections. One is often deemed insufficient.

A series of two or three speed humps set 350 to 550 feet apart are commonplace to prevent drivers from speeding up between them. Warning signs are typically displayed ahead of the road hazard. Even with the signs, the lower visibility conditions of bad weather, or dawn/dusk can cause some very unpleasant surprises for drivers on speed hump streets.

This graphic comes from California Member Stacey Charlton, who wrote How to Fight Speed Bumps, Humps, and Cushions Part 1 and Part 2 that was featured in December 2021 on the NMA's Driving in America Blog.

Detroit's public works department uses the following criteria for the placement of speed humps:

Local residential streets with speed limits of 25 mph or less

Nearby schools and parks

Streets with a record of speeding and traffic accidents


Streets with cut-throughs to or from arterial roads

Areas with block housing density Areas with numbers of children present Resident support on the block and a valid request made to the city

While some neighbors might like the speed humps, not all do. Detroit resident Pamela Foster exclaimed, "It's too many of them...they're putting them in spots that we don't need." Often the residents reconsider after the humps have been in place for a while and have to be dealt with daily. Be careful what you wish for.

It will be interesting watching for reactions by Detroit commuters as the hump count continues to grow.

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

Co-founder Vicki Sanfelipo states, "Road



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Brothers Indicted In Widening Illinois Red Light Camera **Corruption Probe**

The US Department of Justice is not done prosecuting the individuals responsible for the red light camera scandal in the suburbs of Chicago, Illinois. On Wednesday, brothers James and Joseph Colucci will appear at the federal courthouse in Chicago on charges that they paid off Tony Ragucci, then mayor of Oakbrook Terrace, in return for his endorsement of Safespeed's automated ticketing contract.

Each time a motorist paid a photo ticket, the Colucci brothers pocketed a \$14 cut distributed to their company, DSC Enterprises. This arrangement gave the pair an incentive to pay politicians to maximize the number of tickets issued. The scheme was outlined in Ragucci's

indictment last month, but the brothers and their front company were not revealed in the document. The brothers inherited the deal from their stepfather, Dennis Colucci, who set it up before he died in 2018.

"It was part of the scheme that James Colucci and Joseph Colucci offered and gave things of value to Ragucci, including cash, in return for performing acts in his position as Oakbrook Terrace Mayor to benefit James Colucci, Joseph Colucci, [Safespeed], DSC Enterprises Inc, and [Dennis Colucci], including by signing one-year renewal agreements with [Safespeed]," the grand jury charged.

According to the indictment, Dennis Colucci initially intended to put one of Ragucci's relatives on the payroll of DSC


Enterprises to better conceal the payoffs. Ragucci allegedly preferred to be paid the \$3500 per month directly, with the amount designed to increase if he could generate more photo tickets.

The cameras began issuing tickets in August 2017, but federal officials had by then caught Safespeed cofounder Omar Maani and forced him to turn informant against the people he bribed to avoid prison time. Maani appears to have documented a \$5000 bonus payment to Ragucci upon the 2018 renewal of the red light camera contract, and a \$7500 bonus for the 2019 renewal.

The grand jury indictment charges the Colucci brothers with taking a \$100,305 payment from Safespeed on September 14, 2018, a \$117,068 payment on

November 15, 2018, a \$81,055 payment on November 15, 2018, and a \$127,914 payment on July 15, 2019.

Earlier this month, Crestwood, Illinois, mayor Lou Presta was sentenced to a year in prison after he admitted taking bribes from Safespeed representatives. The court ordered Presta to pay \$70,934 in restitution and cut a check for \$5000 to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the costs incurred in bringing him to justice. Presta must surrender by June 27 for his twelve-month stay at the medium-security Federal Correctional Institution, Oxford in Adams County, Wisconsin.

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Roberts Rules of Order - Simplified

Guiding Principle:

Everyone has the right to participate in discussion if they wish, before anyone may speak a second time.

Everyone has the right to know what is going on at all times.

Only urgent matters may interrupt a speaker.

Only one thing (motion) can be discussed at a time.

A motion is the topic under discussion (e.g., "I move that we add a coffee break to this meeting"). After being recognized by the president of the board, any member can introduce a motion when no other motion is on the table. A motion requires a second to be considered. Each motion must be disposed of (passed, defeated, tabled, referred to committee, or postponed indefinitely).

How to do things:

You want to bring up a new idea before the group.

After recognition by the president of the board, present your motion. A second is required for the motion to go to the floor for discussion, or consideration.

You want to change some of the wording in a motion under discussion After recognition by the president of the board, move to amend by

- adding words,
- striking words or
- striking and inserting words

You like the idea of a motion being discussed, but you need to reword it beyond simple word changes.

Move to substitute your motion for the original motion. If it is seconded, discussion will continue on both motions and eventually the body will vote on which motion they prefer.

You want more study and/or investigation given to the idea being discussed. Move to refer to a committee. Try to be specific as to the charge to the committee.

You want more time personally to study the proposal being discussed. Move to postpone to a definite time or date.

You are tired of the current discussion. Move to limit debate to a set period of time or to a set number of speakers. Requires a 2/3rds vote.

You have heard enough discussion. Move to close the debate. Requires a 2/3 rds vote. Or move to previous question. This cuts off discussion and brings the assembly to a vote on the pending question only. Requires a 2/3 rds vote.

You want to postpone a motion until some later time.

Move to table the motion. The motion may be taken from the table after 1 item of business has been conducted. If the motion is not taken from the table by the end of the next meeting, it is dead. To kill a motion at the time it is tabled requires a 2/3rds vote. A majority is required to table a motion without

You believe the discussion has drifted away from the agenda and want to bring it back. Call for orders of the day.

You want to take a short break. Move to recess for a set period of time.

You want to end the meeting. Move to adjourn.

killing it.

You are unsure that the president of the board has announced the results of a vote correctly. Without being recognized, call for a "division of the house." At this point a roll call vote will be taken.

You are confused about a procedure being used and want clarification.

Without recognition, call for "Point of Information" or "Point of Parliamentary Inquiry." The president of the board will ask you to state your question and will attempt to clarify the situation.

You have changed your mind about something that was voted on earlier in the meeting

for which you were on the winning side. Move to reconsider. If the majority agrees, the motion comes back on the floor as though the vote had not occurred.

You want to change an action voted on at an earlier meeting.

Move to rescind. If previous written notice is given, a simple majority is required. If no notice is given, a 2/3 rds vote is required.

You may INTERRUPT a speaker for these reasons only:

to get information about business – point of information to get information about rules – parliamentary inquiry if you can't hear, safety reasons, comfort, etc. – question of privilege

if you see a breach of the rules – point of order if you disagree with the president of the board's ruling – appeal.



Candidate Criteria:

- 1) Nominated candidate must be between the ages of 18 and 30 with a valid Motorcycle Endorsement on their Driver's License. 31st Birthday must fall after **Meeting Of The Minds** for that year.
- 2) Candidate must be a member in good standing of a State Motorcyclists' Rights Organization (SMRO). Length of membership required in SMRO to be determined by its members if candidate is qualified.
- 3) Candidate must be nominated by their SMRO. Nominations will be accepted from either state or local (District/Chapter/Local) SMRO groups and must be submitted on an MRF approved application form.
- 4) Nomination must be submitted between October 1st and July15th and postmarked no later than July 1st of the year for which the application is submitted.
- 5) The Candidate must also submit a minimum three hundred (300)-word essay on why biker's rights are important to them. A well written essay from the heart is like a picture or blueprint of who the candidate is; coming directly from the candidate, this gives the MRFA&E Board of Directors a better perspective of the individual. Winning candidates will be announced via an MRF E-mail News Release on or about August 15th. All candidates will be notified with a letter of thanks and encouragement to re-submit their candidacy for the next year if they are not the selected winner.

The Motorcycle Safety Foundation will help adventure and dual-purpose riders looking to learn fundamental off-road skills through its newest offering, the AdventureBike RiderCourse (ADVRC).

The course features 12 exercises and an adventure prep discussion that will help riders better understand and control their motorcycle so that they can gain off-road riding confidence and be ready to take on bigger adventure challenges, more advanced training, and participate in more tours, events, and

"Adventure and dual-purpose motorcycles open a whole new world of riding possibilities," notes Erik Pritchard, president and CEO of the Motorcycle Safety Foundation. "Sales in this category have increased more than 46% since 2019. Creating a course to help those new, or a bit rusty, to riding offroad is a need we are excited to meet."

"The AdventureBike RiderCourse will make core off-road skill building available nationwide and help these riders explore the capabilities of their motorcycles," adds Corey Eastman, director of rider education expansion. "We hope riders take this knowledge and go on to discover thousands of ADV riding opportunities."

In fact, more than 100 MSF coaches are working to become certified to teach the AdventureBike RiderCourse by year's end. The msf-usa.org site will be updated regularly as new training sites come online. The MSF AdventureBike RiderCourse is currently available in 12 states through various privateand MSF-run training sites, and under the Adventure Touring Rider Course name

through participating Harley-Davidson Riding Academy locations.

The course is a single-day experience taken on a student's personal ADV or dual-purpose motorcycle. All instruction is done on an MSF-recognized riding range under the guidance of MSF-certified ADVRC rider coaches. As availability of the course spreads nationwide, it will be easier than ever for riders to gain core off-road skills.


