LANE FILTERING

Expect to see motorcycles lane filtering soon, it will be legal under certain circumstances

Lane Filtering is NOT the same as Lane Splitting. Legal for roads with 45 mph or less speed limit; **NOT LEGAL** on **ANY** Freeways.

ARIZONA – As the weather continues to get warmer, Arizonans can expect to see more motorcycles on the road — and more motorcycles means lane filtering will be legal soon.

ABATE of Arizona wants to remind drivers they can expect to see motorcycles lane filtering this fall, as well as remind motorcyclists of the conditions under which lane filtering is legal.

What is Lane filtering?

Lane filtering is when motorcyclists move between two lanes to the front of traffic that is stopped at an intersection.

Motorcycle lane filtering was made legal under certain circumstances in Arizona but it doesn't go into effect just yet.

Officials say the law for lane filtering was designed to prevent or reduce rear-end collisions between approaching vehicles and motorcycles stopped in traffic

Officials say the law for lane filtering was designed to prevent or reduce rear-end collisions between approaching vehicles and motorcycles stopped in traffic.

They added, unlike lane "splitting," lane "filtering" is intended to provide a "safety pocket" for motorcycles when encountering stopped traffic.

Since we have so many snowbirds in Arizona, some drivers may be surprised when they see motorcyclists who are lane filtering.

Officials emphasized that lane filtering between stopped vehicles on roadways with at least two lanes in the same direction and speeds of 45 mph and lower is legal in Arizona.

Having a motorcycle pass closely to your stopped vehicle can be startling.

However, officials say if you're aware that lane filtering is legal and know to expect it, you can maintain an awareness of your surroundings and reduce the element of surprise.

When the law goes into effect, motorcycles will be able to lane filter in Arizona when the following conditions are met, according to officials:

The movement MUST be made safely The individual is on a roadway divided into two or more adjacent traffic lanes in the same direction of travel The individual is on a roadway with a speed limit of 45 miles per hour or less; this means it is never legal on the freeways

The vehicle being overtaken in the same lane is stopped

The motorcycle is traveling at a speed of 15 miles per hour or less

The gas you buy at the pump this summer may become E15—and that's raising concerns

There's a potential change coming soon to the fuels available at both local gas stations you know and those you visit while touring America this summer. Year-long sales of E15 may push fuels friendlier to motorcycles off the pumps at more gas stations and could cause more frequent misfuelling.

Currently, E15 gas is usually only available from mid-September to the end of May. Now, the Biden Administration has authorized gas stations to sell it nationwide in the summer and beyond. But before you put it in your tank, you need to know the concerns about E15 and the damage it could do to your bike.

What is E15?

You're probably familiar with E10, a mixture of 90 percent pure gasoline and up to 10 percent ethanol that's been commonly available at the pump for more than a decade. E15 blends up to 15 percent ethanol and 85 percent pure gasoline—a 50 percent increase in the ethanol content.

Ethanol blended into gasoline has prima-

rily been limited to 10 percent due to problems with the volatility of higher blends contributing to smog during the hot summer months. As a result, the EPA restricts the sale of E15 for use in non-flex-fuel vehicles during the summer.

Renewable Fuel Standard

The Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS) was created by the Energy Policy Act of 2005 and expanded by the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007. The RFS requires annually increasing the amount of biofuels that are blended into vehicle fuels—both gasoline and diesel. Boosting the year-round national blend limit to 15 percent would help meet that goal, but E15 has some problems in market expansion.

For retailers, the cost of retrofitting their pumps to comply with U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulations for selling E15 fuel, added to the expense of switching equipment and signage twice a year, has limited the market availability of E15. Removing the restrictions opens the way for expanding E15 sales.

A problem for motorcycles

The motorcycle community has long understood that ethanol isn't good for motorcycles. Ethanol can cause several problems:

Reduced performance and mileage, since ethanol has one-third less energy than pure gasoline

Absorption of water, further reducing fuel efficiency and potentially resulting in phase separation

Increased engine and exhaust system temperature, since ethanol leans out the fuel/air mixture

Corrosion of metal parts in the fuel system

Damage to fuel lines and gaskets

ABATE of Arizona, the Motorcycle Riders Foundation and the American Motorcyclist Association and most motorcycle manufacturers oppose the expansion of E15 availability.

Inadvertent misfueling with E15 fuel is a significant concern. E15 use can void

manufacturers' warranties, and the EPA has acknowledged that E15 gas can damage engines. The EPA has also stated that E15 cannot be used in motorcycles.


In fact, a vast majority of motorcycles and ATVs in the United States today aren't designed to run on ethanol blends higher than 10 percent. And many vintage machines have problems with any ethanol in the fuel.

Another concern is that the widespread adoption of E15 fuel could reduce the availability of E10 and even further reduce the availability of pure gasoline.

As this sale of E15 gas comes into effect, use care to read all the small labels on blender pumps to avoid misfueling. And when selecting a fuel, be sure to know what your motorcycle manufacturer recommends

The change to year-round E15 sales is just another attack on motorcycling. You can make your opinion known to law-makers.

NRSA To Introduce Mobile Application For Road Safety Enforcement

The National Road Safety Authority (NRSA) is developing a mobile application to improve road safety across the country.

Known as the Public Eye Enforcement Programme (PEEP), the mobile application will empower anyone with a smart phone to record road traffic violations and forward to the Authority for the prosecution of offend-

The Board Chairman of the NRSA, Jeremaine Nkrumah, made this known when he led a team of officials from the Authority to commend the Greater Accra Regional Minister, Henry Quartey, for his leadership and determination in championing road safety in the region.

Their visit was also to recognise the minister for his productive collaboration with stakeholders in managing the operations of motorcycles and tricycles on major roads as well as bringing some sanity to the Madina Zongo Junction within the La Nkwatanang Madina Municipality. A citation was presented to the Regional Minister.

PEEP mobile application

Touching on the mobile application, Mr Nkrumah said it would be piloted in the Greater Accra, Eastern and the Ashanti regions immediately after the new legislative Instrument, drafted by the Authority is approved by Parliament.

"We are currently developing a website and mobile application and we are going to take advantage of the constitution aspect of citizens' arrests and empower anybody who owns a mobile device to be able to record," Mr Nkrumah noted.

He added that the sender of a video which

led to prosecution would be rewarded.

"If a person sends in a video and the video leads to prosecution, the mobile number of the sender if registered with the mobile money, will get a percentage of the fine" he said

Mr Nkrumah explained that statistics have shown an increase in the number of vehicles registered as compared to expansion works on roads across the country.

"What is scary in statistics is that for a country of 9,200 square miles and road network of 78,000 square kilometres, roads do not expand as rapidly as the number of vehicles added onto the industry every day," he said.

He added that 16,000 new vehicles were registered every month, accounting for over 500 vehicles every day into the system.

Tricycle directive

For his part, Mr Quartey thanked the Authority for the recognition and appealed to the officials to support the Greater Accra Regional Coordinating Council (GA-RCC) to revisit the implementation of restrictions on tricycles on the Tema highway.

"We had a meeting with the Police Regional Command and we want to revisit the directive. We believe three months' moratorium is enough.

So I crave your indulgence to avail yourself as quickly as possible for us to move into action, possibly we can do this after the Easter festivities. The RCC has donated a pickup truck and two motorbikes to the Greater Accra Police Command to be used to patrol the stretch of the motorway," he added

He, however, appealed to corporate bodies and stakeholders to support the activities of the RCC in ensuring safety in the region.

"Operation Clean Your Frontage is also in play. We have had four months of sensitisation, which is enough moratorium. After the Easter holidays, all assemblies in the Greater Accra Region will go into full force to ensure the implementation of the Operation Clean Your Frontage by-law," he added.

ARIZONA LEGALIZES LANE FIL-

Arizona Governor Doug Ducey (R) has signed Senate Bill 1273 into law on March 24, 2022, that legalizes lane "filtering" for two-wheeled motorcycles under specified conditions.

SB 1273 was sponsored by Senator Tyler Pace (R-Dist. 25), an avid motorcyclist himself, who clarified that lane filtering and lane splitting are not the same thing, and this new law will only allow for low-speed lane filtering in certain situations, like in Utah and Montana, not "lane splitting" on highways as commonly practiced in California. It was crafted to resemble a similar lane filtering measure enacted in Utah in 2019 that was just recently extended by their state legislature for another 5 years.

According to the bill as written, amended, passed through both chambers of the State house with bipartisan support, and signed into law effective in 90 days after adjournment:

"The operator of a two-wheeled motorcycle may overtake and pass another vehicle that is stopped in the same direction of travel and in the same lane as the operator and may operate the motorcycle between lanes of traffic if the movement may be made safety and it the operator does both of the following:

- 1. Operates the motorcycle on a street that both:
- (a) is divided into at least two adjacent traffic lanes in the same direction of travel.
- (b) has a speed limit that does not exceed forty-five miles per hour.
- 2. Travels at a speed that does not exceed fifteen miles per hour"

Other provisions in the bill spell out the fact that, under Arizona state law, motorcycles are entitled to full use of a lane on the road. They may also ride two abreast -- but no more than two can ride in this configuration across a single lane. Furthermore, motorcycles may not pass other vehicles within a single lane except in the specific situations outlined by the language above. Riding in between lanes is also not allowed by motorcycles in most situations, except in the specific circumstance outlined above.

It's also important to note that this law specifically addresses two-wheeled motorcycles, as trikes and sidecars are prohibited from performing such maneuvers under any circumstances.

Meanwhile, similar lane filtering legisla-

tion (House Bill 2667) has passed the Oklahoma House of Representatives with overwhelming support, by a vote of 70-22 on March 22, and is currently under consideration in the State Senate.

STANDARD DRIVER'S LICENSE APPROVED FOR THREE-WHEELERS IN NEW YORK

After both the reclassification of the three-wheeled motorcycle as a three-wheeled motor vehicle and providing operator licensing requirements similar to nearly every U.S. state, residents in the state of New York can now operate 3-wheelers such as the Polaris Slingshot with a standard driver's license.

Beginning April 20, 2022 drivers in the Empire State can drive an open-air machine with "side-by-side bucket seats, seat belts, and an automated manual transmission or manual transmission option typically found in traditional automobiles" using their standard Dclass driver's license, instead of the previously required motorcycle endorsement. The state of New York has both reclassified the three-wheeled motorcycle as a three-wheeled motor vehicle (often referred to as "autocycle") and conferred operator licensing requirements comparable to nearly every U.S. state.

'EXPANSIVE REMOVAL' OF TAR-IFFS BENEFITS HARLEY-DAVIDSON A deal has been made between the United Kingdom and the United States to suspend retaliatory tariffs on imported American products such as Harley-Davidson motorcycles, leading to potentially cheaper bikes.

Back in 2018, following a dispute with the European Union (of which the UK was then a part) the Trump administration imposed tariffs on imported steel and aluminum. In response, retaliatory tariffs were imposed on US imports such as Levi jeans, whiskey and... Harley-Davidsons.

However, following a meeting between the UK and US trade officials in Washington, DC on March 22, an agreement was reached whereby the US will partially end tariffs on British steel and aluminum.

In response, the UK will suspend retaliatory measures against US products, with the "expansive removal" of tariffs taking effect in June this year.

CYCLE SALES CRASH IN WORLD'S LARGEST MOTORCYCLE MARKET-PLACE

Spiraling cost of fuel prices and rural distress negatively impacted the Indian two-wheeler segment, the largest motor-

cycle market in the world (China is 2nd) and home to the largest manufacturer of two-wheelers, with sales last fiscal year falling sharply to pre-2012 levels.

Two-wheeler sales in India crashed to a 10-year-low, falling to 14,466,000 units in FY22, as per the latest data from the Society of Indian Automobile Manufacturers (SIAM), down from a high of 21,180,000 in 2019, and it was in 2011-2012 that two-wheeler sales were close to this low at 13,409,000 (India's Financial Year is calculated as from 01-April-2021 to 31-March-2022).

Throughout the year, demand for motorcycles and scooters was impacted by moderation in rural demand and higher ownership cost amidst soaring petrol prices, which escalated in almost all months of FY22. New motorcycle sales there are directly correlated with fuel prices, as 62% of that country's fuel sales are consumed by the two-wheeler segment.

BRITISH BIKERS DECLARE 'DECARBONISATION' POLICY; OPPOSE BANNING ICE BIKES The British Motorcyclists Federation (BMF) have detailed three key points in their recently announced decarboniza-tion policy; "regarding the use of internal combustion engine (ICE) motorcycles, the sale of ICE bikes, and the idea of electric battery technology as the only solution going forwards for motorcy-

Specifically, following the BMF Council meeting on April 9th, the Federation's position "is opposed to any proposals to ban the use of motorcycles powered by internal combustion engines (ICE) while such vehicles are still capable of being run," meaning gas is available.

Additionally, the Federation "is opposed to a ban on the sale of new ICE-powered motorcycles while there is the possibility of providing alternatives to fossil fuel and while the electric vehicle charging infrastructure does not adequately support electric motorcycles.

The BMF's third and final point is that it "supports a technology-neutral approach to powering new motorcycles; we do not accept that electric battery technology is

the only approach."

BMF Director, Anna Zee, said, "The use of motorcycles, however powered, rather than cars can make a valuable contribution to reducing carbon and particle emissions and congestion of course.'

ITALY INCENTIVIZES ELECTRIC VEHICLES IN NEW LAW

All over the world, governments are taking huge steps towards the incentivization and mainstream integration of sustainable, low-emission mobility. More than ever before, alternative modes of transport which were once seen as leisure activities, i.e., cycling and electric scooters are now being integrated into the mainstream transportation framework, with infrastructure being developed to accommodate these vehi-

The latest country to roll out some form of new incentivization program is Italy, wherein a law supporting electric vehicles (EVs) will soon be implemented, and isn't just centered around automobiles, but includes lightweight electric vehicles such as motorcycles, mopeds and e-scooters, too. In fact, list prices could be slashed by up to 30% due to the incentives.

Mario Draghi, Italian prime minister, has signed a new Ministerial Decree which is set to finance incentives for the purchase of electric and low-carbon vehicles. The government seeks to allocate sizable resources towards the project, with 650 million Euros per year being set aside until 2024, which translates to a total of nearly two billion Euros until 2024, and a staggering 8.7 billion until 2030.

Not only will the incentivization program help to make low-emission and fully electric transport more accessible to the general public, they'll also provide manufacturers with a much-needed boost. Minister of Economic Development Giancarlo Giorgetti explained that the industry is going through a lot of difficulties including the pandemic, raw materials shortages occurring across the globe, as well as the raging war in Ukraine which has disrupted several economies.

STUDY IDENTIFIES EIGHT CATE-GORIES OF MOTORCYCLIST Vias, a research group from Belgium, has conducted a study into motorcyclists, from which they have determined eight categories of motorcyclist; so what type are you?

Firstly, there is the Time-Optimizer, who uses their motorcycle to minimize the time of the journey. This comprised 11.6% of the sample.

Secondly, we have what Vias called the "Time-For-Me Seeker," who are those riders who like to use the motorcycle to relax, get away from the family or work. According to Vias, this category made up 18.8% of the sample.

Next up is "The Unconditional." According to Vias, this group made up 9.5% of the sample, and these are those riders who go out whenever, no matter the conditions, the time of day, the amount of rain - if the bike has fuel, that fuel will be used.

Moving on now to the fourth group, which Vias called the "Good-Vibe Seeker," who are those who use their motorcycle only when the weather allows for it. These riders ride solely for enjoyment, as well as to avoid using the car. 14.2% fit into the "Good-Vibe" category.

Now, onto group number five: the "I-Want-It-All" class. These are the people who want the best of the best, the option that suits them and their needs perfectly. 18.2% apparently fall into this category.

The sixth group is called "Multimodal," which is the category for people who are not solely riders, and use their motorcycle in conjunction with other forms of transport, as well as instead of a car in good weather. These make up 11% of the sample.

"The Daily User," is category number seven. The Addict. The Junkie. The Two-Wheeled Doper. Many of you reading this fall into this category, that makes up 7.5%.

Only one category to go... That final category, number eight, is "The Life-Long Experience," whose members also probably fall into the "Daily User," class. These are the Lifers who make up 9.2%, and are the cornerstone of motorcycling, because they are the ones who -- intentionally or otherwise -- pass the bug on to others, and keep our wheels

The Vias study was conducted using a sample of 3,000 16-years-old-and-over Belgians.



France, Germany, Italy: Photo Radar Crippled

On Thursday, vigilantes in Bustince-Iriberry, France, toppled the pole-mounted "turret" speed camera on the RD933. The same device had only recently been replaced after it was cut down two months ago. Later on Thursday morning, the speed camera on the RN159 in

Bertrimoutier was destroyed after it failed to prevent an accident between a truck and a car. A white Renault hatchback struck the heavy goods vehicle, knocking it over and causing it to slide onto the shoulder of the road where it crushed the automated ticketing machine. On Tuesday, a pair of turret speed cameras located on the RD626 in Mimizan and Aureilhan were cut down with a power saw.

In Ketsch, Germany, police were so infuriated that a man driving a company car at the speed limit on the A6 had the audacity to flip off a speed camera that Polizeiprasidium Mannheim issued a press release about the incident on Tuesday. Unable to send the man a speeding ticket for the March 25, the department decided instead to charge him with allegedly following too closely.

In Piano di Collecchia, Italy, a local resident smashed the speed camera on the SP18 on Good Friday. In Grottaferrata, on the outskirts of Rome, vigilantes on Tuesday torched the speed camera on the Via Anagnina, completely destroying the device.



Kevin Schwantz Named Grand Marshal of 2022 AMA Vintage Motorcycle Days

30th Annual AMA VMD event will highlight Schwantz's AMA Superbike and Grand Prix career with Suzuki, and much

PICKERINGTON, Ohio (March 25, 2022) — AMA Motorcycle Hall of Famer and 1993 500cc World Champion Kevin Schwantz has been named Grand Marshal for the 2022 AMA Vintage Motorcycle Days event July 22-24 at the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course in Lexington, Ohio.

AMA Vintage Motorcycle Days is the preeminent — and longest-running — vintage motorcycle event in the country, with over 40,000 attendees each year enjoying off-road and road racing, bike shows, AMA Hall of Fame exhibits, camping, Laps For History on the legendary Mid-Ohio circuit and, of course, the country's largest motorcycle swap

Schwantz, who was inducted into the AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame in 1999, began riding at a young age and soon became a club-racing phenom — which launched him into a factory ride with the Yoshimura-Suzuki team in 1985 at just 21 years of age.

Schwantz won three AMA Superbike nationals that year and would win many more in the coming three years before heading to Europe in 1989 to contest the 500cc Grand Prix wars. Schwantz won the 500cc championship in 1993, and retired just two years later, his legacy of 25 GP wins, 21 lap records, 29 pole positions — along with his daring and dynamic personality on and off the bike — cemented in motorsports history forever.

Schwantz went on to own and run the Kevin Schwantz Suzuki School, a highly successful riding school based at Road Atlanta and, in later years, at Barber Motorsports Park.

A special highlight of Schwantz's Grand Marshal appearance — where he'll sign autographs, speak to enthusiasts from the AMA Soundstage, participate in a Lap For History each day at noon (and lead event attendees around the legendary Mid-Ohio circuit), and more — will be an exclusive showing of his 1985 Yoshimura-Suzuki AMA Superbike, which launched his career and which Schwantz recently acquired for his collection.

"Having not attended the VMD event before," Schwantz said, "I'm very much looking forward to July. I love vintage motorcycles and the whole classic-bike scene, and I've heard such good things about VMD over the years, so it'll be fun — especially since we're going to showcase my 1985 Yoshimura/Suzuki Superbike. I can't wait!"

"Kevin Schwantz looms large in motorcycle and motorcycle-racing history," said AMA Editorial and Communications Director Mitch Boehm, "and having him as Grand Marshal at Mid-Ohio this summer for the 30th Anniversary of AMA Vintage Motorcycle Days — along with the AMA Superbike that launched his career — will be a treat for everyone involved. VMD has always been a peak summer experience for enthusiasts from all over the country, and we're planning to make it extra special for Kevin, too."



The CyberPunk 2077 team knew just how to get Keanu Reeves to bite on their offer to be a part of the video game – give his motorcycle company a starring role.

Reeves' love of motorcycles is no secret, so when CyberPunk 2077 said it would feature Arch Motorcycle in it, the deal was sealed.

Reeves co-founded the company in 2011 alongside LA County Choprods' Gard Hollinger, and the futuristic Arch Motorcycle that will be featured in the game is loosely based on its top-of-the-line Method 143, whose carbon fiber mono-cell chassis is an engineering marvel in its own right.

"When CD Projekt Red approached me about doing CyberPunk 2077, they also spoke about integrating - they were fans of, these people that work at the company, were

fans of Arch Motorcycle, and so they approached the idea of creating a specialized Cyberpunk 2077 version of the Arch Motorcycle and I thought that was a very fine idea," said Reeves.

Arch Motorcycle also helped supply the soundtrack for CyberPunk 2077 by taking an Arch Motorcycle out to California City Municipal Airport and recording its exhaust singing its wide-open song because the snarl of an Arch Motorcycle on the boil is a beautiful thing. The audio recordings attempted to capture nuances of the motorcycle's drivetrain and character as well.

That guttural growl will now forever be a part of the CyberPunk77 experience as gamers mob around Night City on a 2077 Arch as Reeves' CyberPunk persona Johnny Silverhand.

It is 4 wheel drive and that is accomplished through chain drive and a forward-reverse lever which gave three gear speeds in each direction so the transfer case was not needed.

When it was found and purchased 5 or 6 years ago, it was still in very good running condition and had never been allowed to set outside. Most of the vehicle is wood and due to inside storage for 60 years 95% of the original wood was saved in the total restoration. You can see in the as purchased photos (yellow trim) how good the wood was, only the side rail boards had to be replaced mainly from being kicked and broken. Before restoration it was used on several Sunday rail trips in the Jackson Ohio area. It will go much faster that you will want to drive it. As you can see from the photos it was professionally and totally disassembled rebuilt, researched for paint scheme and reassembled. With the wood being in such good condition it was easy to sand down to the original colors and markings.



At Largest Market: Two-wheeler sales crash to 10-year-low in FY22

Two-wheeler sales crash to 10-year-low in FY22; motorcycles fall below 9 mn India is the largest manufacturer of two-wheelers and also the largest market for it. (China being second)

New Delhi: Rural distress impacted the Indian two-wheeler segment, one of the largest in the world, in a big way that their sales in 2021-22 fell sharply, for the first time in ten years, to 13,466,000 units, as per the latest data from the Society of Indian Automobile Manufacturers (SIAM). It was in 2011-2012 that the two-wheeler sales were close to this number at 13,409,00.

(India's Financial Year is calculated as from 01-April-2021 to 31-March-2022)

Throughout the year, demand for motor-cycles and scooters was impacted by rural distress and higher ownership cost amidst soaring fuel prices. Sales of two-wheelers, particularly motorcycles failed to gather momentum even during the festive months, leaving the companies burdened with a pile of unsold stocks. As a result, the overall sales of motorcycles fell below the 9-lakh mark for the first time since 2016-2017, SIAM report said.

One of the primary reasons for this downfall is the spiraling cost of fuel prices. Barring two months, petrol prices escalated in almost all months of FY22, sometimes even thrice a month that severely impacted the demand of entry-level motorcycles which is the primary choice of the budget-conscious low-income consumers.

New motorcycle sales are directly correlated with fuel prices, as 62% of the country's fuel sales are consumed by the two-wheeler segment.

According to market experts, spike in auto fuel prices has triggered the rate of deferment majorly among the consumers of below 125cc two-wheelers that hold about 80% of the total market. Besides, shortage of semiconductors and high container charges have also deterred the production levels of OEMs.

Besides, frequent price hikes by the OEMs to overcome the spike in input cost coupled with moderation in rural demand hugely deterred the buying sentiments of consumers.

Additionally, electric vehicle demand continues to witness pickup in the states with higher government incentives like Maharashtra, Gujarat, Delhi, Karnataka etc., which are also key markets for conventional two-wheelers.

All the segments except the two wheelers are in green. Passenger vehicle sales grew 13.2% to 30,69,499 units in FY 22 compared to 27,11,457 units in FY21. Sales of passenger cars stood at 14,67,056 units, utility vehicles at 14,89,178 units and vans at 1,13,265 units.

As fuel prices skyrocket and concerns grow over the running cost of petrol and diesel vehicles, the electric vehicles market has quietly started to build up. As fiscal 2021-22 came to a close, the green brigade — still small in numbers — seems to be coming of age, also charged by government subsidies.







That's not what happened in California last summer. I mean, first of all.. EVERYBODY charges their cellphones after midnight, right? Why would you think they do better with their cars?



- 2) Candidate must be a member in good standing of a State Motorcyclists' Rights Organization (SMRO). Length of membership required in SMRO to be determined by its members if candidate is qualified.
- 3) Candidate must be nominated by their SMRO. Nominations will be accepted from either state or local (District/Chapter/Local) SMRO groups and must be submitted on an MRF approved application form.
- 4) Nomination must be submitted between October 1st and July15th and postmarked no later than July 1st of the year for which the application is submitted.
- 5) The Candidate must also submit a minimum three hundred (300)-word essay on why biker's rights are important to them. A well written essay from the heart is like a picture or blueprint of who the candidate is; coming directly from the candidate, this gives the MRFA&E Board of Directors a better perspective of the individual. Winning candidates will be announced via an MRF E-mail News Release on or about August 15th. Keith Brammer (Die Kreuzen) leather jacket (on display now)

Perhaps no other genre of music is so closely associated with the classic black leather jacket than punk rock. Keith Brammer, of Milwaukee's hardcore punk band Die Kreuzen, has graciously lent his wellworn leather to the H-D Museum. The jack-

et was purchased in New York City in the 1980s and was a constant companion for Brammer throughout his touring days. Check out the Custom Culture gallery to view this piece of Milwaukee music history.

Inspiration and Recovery: Wounded Veteran Climbs the Seven Summits (on display now) In September 2009, Specialist Benjamin Breckheimer, a Cavalry Scout with the U.S. Army 2nd Stryker Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division, was severely wounded during a tour in Afghanistan. His rehabilitation was difficult as he endured numerous surgeries. During this same time, the Harley-Davidson Museum regularly sent care packages including H-D MuseumTM flags dotted with well wishes - to active-duty military personnel. Breckheimer took to mountaineering during his recovery and over the summer carried the H-D MuseumTM flag to the summit of Denali, the highest point in North America. With that peak reached, Breckheimer became the first and only Purple Heart recipient to reach all the Seven Summits, the highest peaks on each of the seven continents. He continues to climb, and he shares his inspiring story to encourage resiliency and support the mental health of veterans and current service members.

Clubs & Competition (on display now)
In the early part of the 20th century, motorcycle culture was a homegrown phenomenon. It grew out of the passion of riders for their evolving sport. The camaraderie that developed around riding and attending competitive events led to the formation of motorcycle clubs that hosted destination rides, family picnics with motorcycle games and other rid-


ing competitions.

The newly reinstalled display case in the Clubs & Competition gallery highlights clothing from club members from primarily the 1930s and 1940s. The clothing selections on view include full dress uniforms, shirts, sweaters, jackets and caps, customized by the owners with their club's name and logo, and pins or patches indicating membership in the American Motorcyclist Association. The H-D Archives collection includes Motorclothes® apparel sold in H-D® product catalogs but also non-H-D produced clothing items that have been proudly customized by riders.

Gail Anderson's 1986 Softail® Custom
motorcycle, "Harley Fox," built by her partner Bob Burrows, took top prize at the first

her custom bike and themed riding gear,
Anderson presented a striking image that fit
the growing visibility and exciting new
options for women riders in the 1980s.

Alfonso Sotomayor's 1957 Model FL (on display now)

The Harley-Davidson Museum is proud to announce its collection has recently grown with the addition of a 1957 Model FL that was ridden by famed Mexican stunt rider and racer Alfonso Sotomayor Canales. Harley-Davidson's history in Mexico dates back to at least 1913. In the 1920s, the brand was more frequently spotted throughout Mexico City as the motorcycles proved popular with the local traffic police who would also perform stunts with their Harley-Davidson® bikes. After racing from the 1930s into the 1960s, Sotomayor launched his own stunt riding career by performing the famed "Salto de la Muerte" or Jump of Death. Learn more about Sotomayor's feats of derring-do and Harley-Davidson's early entry into Mexico with this new display located in the Custom Culture
