2023 BILLS AND HOW TO GET A BILL PASSED

With less than 100 days to go before the start of the 2024 legislative, how did Arizona do at passing legislation in 2023? Did you know more than 132,600 bills were introduced in the 2023 state legislative sessions across the country with almost 30,800 of them enacted?

That means the states saw a 23 percent effectivity rate for state legislatures combined this year. That is a drop from 28 percent in 2022. When working on state government affairs the volume of information can be maddening. Especially when you work on legislation in several states like we do.

The states introduced 44 percent more bills this year than in 2022. This may be due, in part, to the fact that Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, and Texas had no even-year legislative session in 2022. However, states like Oregon, Pennsylvania, and Maine introduced significantly more bills this year, with more than a 100 percent difference from last year.

Which state introduced the highest number of bills?

NEW YORK – New York saw 17,159 bills introduced. Wyoming had 361 bills introduced. Arizona ranked 25th with 1,648 bills introduced.

Which state enacted the highest number of bills?

TEXAS – Texas enacted 4,410 new bills this year. Massachusetts only enacted 21. Arizona ranked 37 with 221 bills enacted. The District of Columbia enacted over twice as many bills as Arizona.

Which state passed the highest percentage of bills relative to the number they introduced?

COLORADO – Colorado ranked first with a 77.97% pass rate. Massachusetts was last with a .020% pass rate. Arizona ranked 38th with a 13.41% passing rate.

We were able to get some really good bills introduced this past session and through the legislature and onto the Governor's desk. Unfortunately, most of our bills were vetoed. We did manage to help get a few bills across the finish line and enacted.

HB2209 Economic opportunity; industrial development authority (Carter) HB2589 Emergency medical technicians; military reciprocity (Payne) SB1454 Veteran suicide prevention; pilot program (Shope) SCR1015 Initiative; referendum; signatures; legislative districts (Mesnard)

We were able to get some really bad freedom infringing bills killed or pulled also. Twelve ANTI-FREEDOM bills pertaining to the right to keep and bear arms by a single legislator. Oops. SB1412 Motorcycle lane splitting repeal (Wadsack) Sen Wadsack immediately pulled the bill after we spoke to her.

There is no secret formula to this. Well maybe a little BBQ sauce on the side.


Here are my quick tips if you want legislation enacted.

1. MAKE SURE IT'S A GOOD BILL

Bad legislation is just that... BAD. I am not only picky on who we take on as a client, but also the bills we lobby for. Never try to throw something up on the wall just to see if it sticks. You'll get a reputation for crappy bills and no one will want to work with you.

2. MAKE SURE YOU HAVE A GOOD BILL SPONSOR

I work with a handful of legislators on a consistent basis because I know where they stand on a variety of issues.

The legislators I work with on bills are the same legislators that I would vote for personally. They have integrity and are willing to listen to a constituent when needed. And I work with legislators on both sides of the aisle to get our agenda through.


Which leads me to the final tip ...

3. HAVE A GOOD GROUND GAME

Defenses may win Super Bowls, but a good ground game will get legislation passed. Email and phone calls to legislators from their constituents will get support that is needed for a committee or floor vote. I never go into a floor vote without knowing the whip count on votes. This is not only beneficial for our clients but for the legislator who is sponsoring the bill. If I can provide them with who I know will support the bill or where the opposition is coming from, they will never be blindsided.

As you see, all three things work together. What does 2024 have in store for Arizona? I have already been taking some stakeholder meetings and have a few sponsors for bills upcoming.

LANE FILTERING IS LEGAL

ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES 28-903 F
The operator of a two-wheeled motorcycle may overtake and pass

another vehicle that is stopped in the same direction of travel and in the same lane as the operator and may operate the motorcycle between lanes of traffic if the movement may be made safely and if the operator does both of the following:

- 1. Operates the motorcycle on a street that both:
- (a) Is divided into at least two adjacent traffic lanes in the same direction of travel.
- (b) Has a speed limit that does not exceed forty-five miles per
- 2. Travels at a speed that does not exceed fifteen miles per hour.

Membership from a member's point of view

Some things never change and, at the same time, change is constant.

Both thoughts hit me as I read the Coordinator's message from the summer of 1992.

What is the most effective way for ABATE of Arizona to accomplish their objectives? They were asking that question in 1992 and we're asking it today.

The primary answer offered by that Coordinator was building membership in general, and stimulating that membership to be active. Some things never change... we are having that very conversation in 2023. Some Chapters are struggling for their existence, while others may have relatively large membership numbers, and still have difficulty getting bodies where they're needed to support events and legislative influence.

As a member for 13 years before joining the officer ranks of the High Country Chapter, I look at membership primarily from a member's perspective. What does being a member of ABATE of Arizona mean and does it mean the same thing as it did when I first joined? I see a lot of change in the motorcycling world since the mid-2000s when I started riding. It seems to have exploded in so many ways: rider demographics, riding group opportunities, ride equipment choices, broad acceptance of motorcycle riders as mainstream among non-riders, and just the sheer number of riders. Change is constant and the motorcycling landscape looks very different today. I think it's possible that back in he day ABATE was one of the few riding group options riders had outside of clubs. So, Chapters and meetings followed the club model to fill that void – and for a great cause. Today there are so many options, many (maybe most?) supporters don't look at it through that lens – it is a political action organization. Period.

If we follow that thought, and ABATE separates from the club chapter/monthly meeting model, what replaces it? The Cause. What's most important to me as an ABATE supporter is that I know what's going on in the legislature constantly. I have access to up-to-date information about what's being worked on and know when I need to send an email, pick up a phone, show up at the Capitol. Chapters should be communication channels to their supporters, whether a supporter ever shows up to a meeting.

ABATE of Arizona is all about freedom and that applies to riders and non-riders alike. ABATE members are typically members of other groups that have nothing to do with riding but everything to do with freedom. Turn that around, and look at the non-riding folks who support freedom-focused groups and they are prime candidates for ABATE support.

One of the startling stats in The Coordinator's message from 1992 was that California's ABATE support went from 1,900 to 12,000 after their mandatory helmet law was passed. I believe we can get those kind of numbers by delivering timely, relevant information to freedom-loving Arizonans regardless of their riding status and whether we ever see them at a Chapter meeting.

The Arizona Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Foundation Financial Assistance Helmet Program

How it works

- AMSAF Vouchers are valid towards the purchase of a \$200.00 or higher DOT Certified Full Face or Modular Street Helmet.
- Vouchers are only valid to those dealers approved by AMSAF and listed on the AMSAF website.
- Vouchers are not valid for discounted, special order or discontinued helmets.
- Purchased helmet is non-returnable if warning tag is cut off. Helmets may be returnable at the discretion of the dealer.
- Voucher is valid for a \$125.00 credit toward qualified helmet due to grant received from the Governor's Office of Highway Safety.
- Dealer or store will give an additional 25% off of Helmet MSRP.
- \$50.00 tax deductible donation is required to AMSAF at time of application.

The Electrifying Truth

An in-depth analysis of the comprehensive costs associated with electric vehicle (EV) ownership is crucial for an understanding of the economic landscape surrounding the attempted mass transition from internal combustion engine vehicles (ICEVs) to EVs. Major selling points promoted by EV advocates are lower maintenance and fueling costs over the life of the vehicle and the common claim that reductions in battery prices will eventually make EVs less expensive to own than ICEVs.

Setting aside some of the questionable assumptions used in deriving such favorable economics for EVs, no one has attempted to calculate the full financial benefit of the wide array of direct subsidies, regulatory credits, and subsidized infrastructure that contribute to the economic viability of EVs. The average model year 2021 EV would cost \$48,698 more to own over a 10-year period without \$22 billion in government favors given to EV manufacturers and owners.

EV advocates claim that the cost of electricity for EV owners is equal to \$1.21 per gallon of gasoline, but the cost of charging equipment and charging losses, averaged out over 10 years and 120,000 miles, is \$1.38 per gallon equivalent on top of that. Adding the costs of the subsidies to the true cost of fueling an EV would equate to an EV owner paying \$17.33 per gallon of gasoline.

And these estimates do not include the hundreds of billions more in subsidies in the Inflation Reduction Act (2022) for various aspects of the EV supply chain, particularly for *battery manufacturing*. It is not an overstatement to say that the federal government is subsidizing EVs to a greater degree than even wind and solar electric.

Study Key Points

- The cost of producing electric vehicles (EVs) is far higher than the prices they are being sold for. Nearly \$22 billion in federal and state subsidies and regulatory credits suppressed the retail price of EVs in 2021 by an average of almost \$50,000.
- Regulatory credits with bonus EV multipliers from federal fuel efficiency and greenhouse gas emissions standards and state EV sales mandates provide an average of \$27,881 in benefits per vehicle for producers of EVs.
- Home and public charging stations used by EVs put a significant strain on the electric grid, resulting in an average of \$11,833 in socialized costs per EV over 10 years, which are shouldered by utility ratepayers and taxpayers.
- Direct state and federal subsidies for EVs average \$8,984 per vehicle over 10 years.

The true costs of fueling an electric vehicle, including excess charging costs and subsidies, is equal to \$17.33 per gallon of gasoline, the analysis found.

It shows that electricity is a long way from becoming a cost-effective transportation fuel compared to gasoline, if ever.

The other thing we must look at is increasing our membership and getting our message out to as many people as possible. In California, before the helmet bill there were approximately 1,900 members. Now, after the bill, there are close to 12,000 members. Hindsight is 20/20, but it's also always late. We must learn from this to prevent it from happening here. So, get involved. Talk to everyone you or meet that rides a motorcycle or just believes in freedom and get them involved too because, in the years to come, the fight for freedom will not get any easier.
