Mike Infanzon will no doubt be following up on all the bills in the Legislature that we are following this year, along with several issues on the national level. Two things of real importance on the national level are the "Bikers in the Beltway" event, and the annual "Meeting of the Minds". The Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) who is our representatives in Washington DC is presenting the 15th Annual Michael "Boz" Kerr Bikers in the Beltway National Motorcyclists Lobby Day.

This will be held May 21st, 2024 in our nation's capitol. There is also a prep meeting and discussion of issues on Monday May 20th.

In September the MRF is once again putting on their National Motorcyclist Conference which is known as the "Meeting of the Minds". The convention will be held in St. Louis, Missouri from September 25th through September 29th, 2024. Make plans to have at least one member of your Chapter attend this event.

There will be a lot more information coming out on this but please plan on attending and mark your calendars and get your time planned so you can be there. If you are not yet a member of the MRF, I strongly urge you to join. The MRF represents ALL motorcyclists on a national level in Washington DC. They have a dedicated Lobbyist who lobbies for us all. They also publish The MRF Reports to inform us of what is happening in Washington. This is too big a job for just us; we need the MRF to work for all the State Motorcycle Rights Organizations in the country. They need our support to do it. Please consider joining the MRF and encourage others to also join. The information is in the Masterlink. Sign up to receive MRF alerts! Be sure not to miss any news or calls to action from the MRF! Email – mrfoffice@mrf.org to make sure your e-mail is included on your membership.

Remember that the reason more motorcyclists are not members of ABATE is because they have never been asked to join! SO when you are out with other riders at an event or maybe you just ran into another rider at the gas stop, ASK! Always carry a membership tri-fold with you. February Legislative Update

We are a few weeks into the Arizona Fifty-sixth Legislature Second Regular Session. While we were expecting a contentious start this session, it has been rather mild.

As of January 19th: Bills posted: 888

Memorials/resolutions posted: 59

There are several deadlines to know about. Currently, the House is limited to only 7 more bills per member. House Rule 8C: . . . Every bill, resolution or memorial shall have at least one prime sponsor. A member may not be the prime sponsor of more than seven bills introduced after the fourth day of each regular session. For the purposes of this rule the first name on a bill shall be considered the prime sponsor.

Last day for House Members to submit bill requests to Legislative Council – Friday, February 2, 2024.

Last day for introduction of bills - Monday, February 5, 2024. House Rule 8C: Bills, resolutions, and memorials may be introduced during the first 29 days of regular session . . . Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.

Last day for House consideration of House Bills – Friday, February 16, 2024. House Rule 9F: . . . all House Bills shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the 60th day (March 7) of session falls .

Last day for House consideration of Senate Bills – Friday, March 22, 2024 House Rule 9F: . . . all Senate Bills shall be considered by committees prior to the Saturday of the week in which the 90th day (April 6) of session falls. Here are the bills we are tracking so far, but remember we still have more to come. Don't forget to sign into the RTS System and weigh in on the bills.

HB2037 - Department of transportation; continuation

Summary

The statutory life of the Arizona Department of Transportation is extended 8 years to July 1, 2032. Retroactive to July 1, 2024

HB2142 - Move over law study committee

Sponsor

Rep. David L. Cook (R)

Summary

Creates a Move Over Law Committee and establishes the criteria for membership. Prohibits committee members from receiving compensation for participation, excepting the reimbursement of expenses by the members appointed by the Governor. Directs the Committee to assess the efficacy of the emergency vehicle law and to determine if additional promotion of the law is warranted, identify any additional resources or policies that would enhance public safety, propose legislation to address issues identified by the Committee, make policy recommendations and compile and submit a report of the Committees activities and recommendations for the Governor and

legislature by December 1, 2024. The Committee is repealed October 1, 2025.

HB2179 - Traffic citation quota; prohibition

Sponsor

Rep. Alexander Kolodin (R)

Summary

Prohibits a municipality, municipal police department, county Board of Supervisors or sheriff's department, or the Department of Public Safety (DPS) from implementing a traffic complaint quota system, base the determination of a peace officer's rank based on the number of traffic complaints they issue, or consider that number when determining that officer's rank.

HB2180 - Gasoline formulations; air quality

Sponsor

Rep. Alexander Kolodin (R)

Summary

Stipulates that the maximum vapor pressure for gasoline sale by a retail seller shall be 9 pounds per square inch from October 1 through March 31 and 7 pounds per square inch from April 1 through September 30 of each year for counties with a population of 1,200,000. Sets standards, including exemptions, for gasoline that is stored, shipped, produced and sold, to comply with if the gasoline qualifies for a waiver granted by federal authorities, including stipulations for pressure and oxygen content, or any other thresholds prescribed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA.) Permits the legislature to petition Weights and Measurements Division of the Department of Agriculture to allow a registered supplier or oxygenate blender to comply with customized standards if the supplier or oxygenate blender can demonstrate it adheres to state law and danger might result from supply shortages of ethanol. Establishes the standards for the supplier or blender, or all suppliers or blenders to petition to comply with standards other than are set forth by this law. Directs the Associate Director to consult with the Director of the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to implement these standards. Directs the Director of DEQ to submit proposed modifications to the gasoline fuel formulation requirements recommended to the US EPA. The balance of the bill applies to selling gasoline or oxygenate by one seller to another, rules for gasoline reformulation in other zoned areas and a final report of compliance or non-compliance by October 1, 2025. (More)

HB2332 - Traffic; vehicle laws; cities; prohibition

Summary

Prohibits local authorities from enacting or enforcing an ordinance or regulation the prohibits "cruising" (defined) or limits motor vehicle suspension modifications or bumper heights.

HB2370 - Oxygenated fuel; federal approval; extension

Sponsor

Rep. Gail Griffin (R)

Summary

Extends the deadline for the United State Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to approve proposed modifications to the gasoline fuel formulation requirements to July 1, 2027 so that Laws 2017, Chapter 295, Section 2 becomes effective. Contains emergency clause.

HB2522 - Defensive driving schools; fees

HB2573 - Use fuel dispenser labels; penalties

Sponsor

Rep. Leo Biasiucci (R)

HCR2018 - Tax prohibition; vehicle mileage; monitoring

Sponsor

Rep. Travis Grantham (R)

Summary

The 2024 general election ballot is to carry the question of whether to amend Article IV of the Constitution of Arizona, prohibiting the state, and any county, city, town, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision, from imposing a tax or fee on any person based on the vehicle miles traveled by the person in a motor vehicle, or enact any rule or law to monitor or limit the vehicle miles traveled by a person in a motor vehicle unless the rule or law requires that the person voluntarily consents to the monitoring or limitation. Stipulates that this change does not apply to an interstate agreement to administer the payment or reporting of fuel taxes for registration fees for commercial vehicles that operate in more than one state.

SB1003 - Prohibition; photo radar

Sponsor

Sen. Wendy Rogers (R)

Summary

Prohibits the use of "photo enforcement systems" (defined) by law enforcement and local authorities to enforce traffic laws. Contains a legislative intent clause.

SB1010 - Vehicle mileage; tracking; tax; prohibitions

Sponsor

Sen. Jake Hoffman (R)

Summary

Prohibits a city, town, county or political subdivision from considering or establishing Vehicles Miles Travel Reduction goals for use with state projects; or track or maintain a record of personal vehicle miles of travel records (via odometer readings, cameras, or any other means of recording) of any person; or impose any mileage fee or tax on miles traveled by an individual in a motor vehicle.

SB1011 - General plan; transportation; independent study

Sponsor

Sen. Jake Hoffman (R)

Summary

Eliminates the requirement of routes, parking and street crossing areas for bicycles in municipal plans. Requires municipal plans not include policies or projects that reduce motor vehicle traffic system capacity and that any plan components that affect the level of service on an arterial street be subject to an independent, emergency vehicle impact study.

SB1012 - Transportation system performance; ADOT

Sponsor

Sen. Jake Hoffman (R)

Summary

Amends existing requirements to cover the development of performance metrics and the use of said metrics in board presentation material for the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) to include mobility, integration of modes of travel, and safety improvements. Requires ADOT to use new weighting metrics for deciding on highway and transit products that include weighting congestion reduction and increased mobility at 40% each for highway projects and safety improvements/reduction in roadway fatalities at 20% for highway projects. For transit projects, ridership on each route may not be weighted lower than 70% of the system average. The ridership minimum may be weighted at 50% of the system average if the lines are contracted to a private operator. Prohibits the ADOT from considering or adopting a motor vehicle travel mile reduction target, or using metrics that provide benefits based on race, color or ethnicity.

SB1052 - All-terrain vehicles; definition

Summary

Replaces all references to 2,500 pounds with 3,500 pounds as the maximum weight that applies to the definition of "off-road vehicles" (defined.)

LANE FILTERING IS LEGAL

The operator of a two-wheeled motorcycle may overtake and pass another vehicle that is stopped in the same direction of travel and in the same lane as the operator and may operate the motorcycle between lanes of traffic if the movement may be made safely and if the operator does both of the following:


- 1. Operates the motorcycle on a street that both:
- (a) Is divided into at least two adjacent traffic lanes in the same direction of travel.
- (b) Has a speed limit that does not exceed forty-five miles per hour.
- Travels at a speed that does not exceed fifteen miles per hour.

In 2021, 2,594 crashes involving motorcycles were reported to ADOT, with 2,052, or about 79%, resulting in injuries. By comparison, there were 121,345 accidents across the state in 2021 involving any type of motor vehicle, but only 35,203, or 29%, resulted in injuries.

Bystander Assistance is a relatively new concept and refers to community based First Response in Traumatic Emergency events that require quick response. Like CPR (which has it's foundation in responding to Cardiac Events and Choking) and First Aid (that concentrates its efforts on common everyday injuries that might occur), Bystander Assistance has a tremendously important role to play in preparing our communities to respond to Trauma. A person's chance in their lifetime of coming upon a crash is more likely than their chance of coming upon someone who has just had a cardiac event or is choking. First Aid begins to prepare the student for trauma but Stops short of training them for highspeed roadside user events. In a motorcycle crash, this information is imperative.

EMS has done a great deal to improve its system with increased training of responders, improved structure and Improved equipment, yet a gap exists between the time of the event and when the professional rescuers arrive. This gap must be filled with community training of individuals so that they not only know how to effectively respond and assist the EMS, but also know how to protect themselves so that they do not become injured in the process of trying to help.

What is Accident Scene Management?

Accident Scene Management (ASM) is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization dedicated to reducing injuries and fatalities to Motorcyclists through First Response Education. ASM has trained nearly 40,000 students through the expertise of over 100 instructors in 32 states across the USA. We have become the largest Motorcycle Trauma Training organization in the world, leading the way with instructors in South Africa, Australia, the Philippines & the USA.







SB1055 - Off-highway vehicle study committee; extension

Sponsor

Sen. Sine Kerr (R)

Summary

Establishes the Arizona Off-Highway Vehicle Study Committee to meet to collect and study information regarding off-highway vehicle issues. Requires the committee create and submit a report by January 1 of each year to the Governor and Legislature that details committee activities, findings and recommendations. Stipulates the committee is repealed after May 31, 2025.

SB1064 - Gasoline formulations; air quality.

Sponsor

Sen. Justine Wadsack (R)

Summary

Permits in counties with more than adherence with California Phase 3 reformulated gasoline, gasoline that meets standards for federal Phase II reformulated gasoline. Sets standards, including exemptions, for gasoline that is stored, shipped, produced and sold, to comply with if the gasoline qualities for a waiver granted by federal authorities, including stipulations for pressure and oxygen content, or any other thresholds prescribed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA.) Establishes the standards for the supplier or blender, or all suppliers or blenders to petition to comply with standards other than are set forth by this law if a petitioner can prove that maintaining standards presents a possible shortage of supply. Permits the legislature to petition the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to allow retail sellers to be allowed to sell or offer gasoline for sale that does not meet the standards prescribed above. Directs the DEQ to submit proposed modifications to the gasoline fuel formulation requirements recommended to the US EPA. The balance of the bill applies to selling gasoline or oxygenate by one seller to another, rules for gasoline reformulation in other zoned areas and a final report of compliance or non-compliance by October 1, 2025.

SCR1001 - Photo radar prohibition

Sponsor

Sen. Wendy Rogers (R)

Summary

Bans local authorities and state agencies from using automated photo enforcement systems to identify excessive speed violations or failures to obey traffic control devices. More.

SCR1002 - Prohibit tax; monitoring; vehicle mileage

Sponsor

Sen. Jake Hoffman (R)

Summary

The 2024 general election ballot is to carry the question of whether to amend the state constitution to prohibit the imposition of a tax or fee based on vehicle miles traveled and prohibit the creation of any rule or law to monitor or limit the miles traveled in a motor vehicle.




