In some states, motorcyclists have successfully lobbied for favorable laws, but without a consistent presence at the polls, these gains can be reversed or neglected. Voting is not just about electing representatives; it's about influencing policy on issues such as red-light laws, road-sharing regulations, and accident prevention measures. Motorcyclists need to realize that their vote is a powerful tool in advocating for safer riding conditions and fair treatment under the law.

Additionally, motorcyclists must recognize the potential for unity within their ranks. Collectively, they can represent a formidable voting bloc; capable of swaying elections and pushing for legislative action on issues like motorcycle parking, road access, and funding for rider education programs. By engaging in political advocacy and exercising their right to vote, motorcyclists can ensure that their concerns are placed front and center, influencing not just transportation policy, but broader political agendas that impact their way of life. It's not enough to ride with pride; motorcyclists must also vote

with purpose.

The need for motorcyclists to show up at the polls this election is critical. With so many decisions being made at the local, state, and national levels that directly affect motorcyclists, it's essential for the community to engage in the political process. Voting is the simplest and most effective way for riders to ensure their voices are heard and that their interests are represented. By turning out in force on Election Day, motorcyclists can secure a safer and more equitable future on the road.

SECURE YOUR LOAD LAW WENT INTO EFFECT September 19, 2024!!!

On ALL Arizona roads not just highways. Thanks to Senator Shawnna Bolick for sponsoring this important legislation and championing safety on the roads!

Ch. 183, Laws 2024 (SB1376 - Vehicle loads; restrictions) Extends vehicle load restrictions from highways to streets and roadways, applied uniformly throughout Arizona and in all its political subdivisions. Exempts vehicles being used for agricultural purposes on a farm.

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dent repair shops have trouble with various legislation and regulations which hamper their business. Issues such as: Right to Repair, so you or your favorite shop, have access to the tools, parts, and technology you need. Right to Modify, your right to modify and/or customize your vehicle as you see fit. Renewable Fuels, the fuels needed for motorcycles is under attack. We need fuels with no more than 10% ethanol to fill our bikes. Fuels with more than that

amount of ethanol will damage motorcycles and small engines. There are also End of Life Directives issues. In Europe, directives are requiring that vehicles over a certain age MUST be turned in for destruction. These ideas are popping up here in the States.

The Motorcycle Riders Foundation is our voice at the national level to help fight these issues. I strongly urge ALL ABATE members to become members of the MRF. If you are already a member, Thank You. LANE FILTERING IS LEGAL

ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES 28-903 F
The operator of a two-wheeled motorcycle may overtake and pass
another vehicle that is stopped in the same direction of travel and
in the same lane as the operator and may operate the motorcycle
between lanes of traffic if the movement may be made safely and
if the operator does both of the following:

- 1. Operates the motorcycle on a street that both:
- (a) Is divided into at least two adjacent traffic lanes in the same direction of travel.
- (b) Has a speed limit that does not exceed forty-five miles per hour.
- 2. Travels at a speed that does not exceed fifteen miles per hour.



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


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Motorcycle Awareness Program {MAP} Report

Failure-to-yield or Right-of-Way Issues

These are the typical right of way issues that result in an accident between a motor vehicle and a motorcycle:

Intersections: Motor vehicle pulling out in front of or turning into the path of a motorcycle at an intersection(turning left in front of). A front end collision results in both situations – this is the most common accident

<u>Blind Spots</u>: Not observing motorcycle in blind spot resulting in a sideswiping collision

Following too closely: Not keeping distance between motor vehicle and motorcycle resulting in a rear end collision

<u>Visibility Issues</u>: Surrounding traffic and roadway backgrounds can make motorcycles difficult to see
